Bishop Talley on EWTN during Catholic Social Ministry Gathering

WASHINGTON -- The Catholic Social Ministry Gathering, which brought together more than 500 Catholics who work in social justice ministries, was held Saturday, Feb. 3 through Tuesday, Feb. 6 in Washington, DC.

Still, speakers addressed issues of immigration, race and the environment in keynote presentations, while community and policy workshops covered poverty, hunger, housing, the opioid crisis, Native American issues, domestic violence, criminal justice issues, nuclear war and labor, as well as international issues.

The event ended with an advocacy visit to Capitol Hill.

Bishop David Talley, as a member of the USCCB Committee of Justice, Peace and Human Development, attended the event.

He was interviewed on EWTN News Nightly about his work and commitment to social justice issues?

News Nightly anchor Wyatt Goolsby asked Bishop Talley what issues were being addressed during the gathering.

"Our focus is on the Dignity of all Human Life -- from the moment of conception, to end of life issues, and all issues in between," he said. "Life, immigration, dignity of life, racism, and housing -- these are all issues of the social fabric of our country."

Organized by the USCCB's Department of Justice, Peace, and Human Development, along

with 16 other departments and agencies, this year's gathering brought together individuals from over 100 dioceses and 45 states. The attendees are a mix of young students and seasoned social activists who have worked for Catholic-related causes for years.

A walk through the exhibitor's hall was evidence the range of affiliated groups who participate in the event: A mix of climate change activists, immigration rights workers, pro-life and anti-death penalty organizations, and everything in between. Teenagers wearing "Black Lives Matter" t-shirts brush up against nuns in full habit wearing buttons in support of immigrants, next to folks wearing shirts from this year's March for Life. In some respects, it's a visible witness of Pope Francis's call in Laudato si' to see that "everything is connected."

Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, president of the USCCB, said he hoped the gathering would bring together factions within the Church that often found themselves labeled as "social justice Catholics" or "pro-life Catholics" in a unified witness.

"If you've given your whole life and you want the death penalty ended, you'll do anything to do that, and I say that's good, just recognize that's one angle," said DiNardo. "Then, you'll find other people who really fight to close abortion clinics or to give help to those with unplanned pregnancies."

"We can be good Catholics together," he said.

Immigration was the focus of the first day of the gathering and perhaps one of the hottest debates.

In his keynote address, "Where is Your Brother?" Auxiliary Bishop Eusebio Elizondo of Seattle spoke after a video address by Pope Francis about migrants and refugees, and our call as Catholics to welcome, protect, promote and integrate the strangers in our midst.

"After hearing Francis' message, I was just tempted to sit down and shut up," Elizondo quipped, to much laughter.

Skipping the policy debate, he spoke as pastor of an imperfect flock that must seek always to become better disciples. Noting that discipleship is the work of a lifetime, he encouraged those present to see immigration work not as "work" but rather as "a mission to encounter our brother and sister."

While the three-day immersion in Catholic social teaching took up the largest block of the conference, the conference's crescendo is "Hill Day," when activists journey up to Capitol Hill to introduce their Catholic concerns to lawmakers.

Lent is time to become aware of false prophets, cold hearts

Pope gives remedy for strengthening these ills during Lent

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Catholics should use the season of Lent to look for signs and symptoms of being under the spell of false prophets and of living with cold, selfish and hateful hearts, Pope Francis said.

Together with "the often bitter medicine of the truth," the church -- as mother and teacher -- offers people "the soothing remedy of prayer, almsgiving and fasting," the pope said in his message for Lent, which began Feb. 14 for Latin-rite Catholics.

The pope also invited all non-Catholics who are disturbed by the increasing injustice, inertia and indifference in the world, to "join us then in raising our plea to God in fasting and in offering whatever you can to our brothers and sisters in need."

The pope's Lenten message, which was released at the Vatican Feb. 6, looked at Jesus' apocalyptic discourse to the disciples on the Mount of Olives, warning them of the many signs and calamities that will signal the end of time and the coming of the son of man.

Titled, "Because of the increase of evildoing, the love of many will grow cold" (Mt. 24:12), the papal message echoes Jesus' caution against the external enemies of false prophets and deceit, and the internal dangers of selfishness, greed and a lack of love.

Today's false prophets, the pope wrote, "can appear as 'snake charmers," who manipulate human emotions in order to enslave

others and lead them where they would have them go."

So many of God's children, he wrote, are: "mesmerized by momentary pleasures, mistaking them for true happiness"; enchanted by money's illusion, "which only makes them slaves to profit and petty interests"; and convinced they are autonomous and "sufficient unto themselves.

"False prophets can also be 'charlatans,' who offer easy and

immediate solutions to suffering that soon prove utterly useless," he wrote. People can be trapped by the allure of drugs, "disposable relationships," easy, but dishonest gains as well as "virtual," but ultimately meaningless relationships, he wrote.

The pope asked people to examine their heart to see "if we are falling prey to the lies of these false prophets" and to learn to look at things more closely, "beneath the surface," and recognize that what comes from God is lifegiving and leaves "a good and lasting mark on our hearts."

Christians also need to look for any signs that their love for God and others has started to dim or grow cold, the pope said.

Greed for money is a major red flag, he wrote, because it is the "root of all evil" and soon leads to a rejection of God and his peace.

The remedy for these ills can be strengthened during Lent with prayer, almsgiving and fasting, he wrote.

Praying more enables "our hearts to root out our secret lies and forms of self-deception, and then to find the consolation God offers," he said in his message.

"Almsgiving sets us free from greed and helps us to regard our neighbor as a brother or sister," it said.

Urging people to make charitable giving and assistance a genuine part of their everyday life, he asked that people look at every request for help as a request from God himself. Look at almsgiving as being part of God's generous and providential plan, and helping his children in need.

Finally, "fasting weakens our tendency to violence; it disarms us and becomes an important opportunity for growth," he said, while also letting people feel what it must be like for those who struggle to survive.

It also "expresses our own spiritual hunger and thirst for life in God. Fasting wakes us up. It makes us more attentive to God and our neighbor," he wrote, and "revives our desire to obey God, who alone is capable of satisfying our hunger."

The pope also reminded people to take part in the "24 Hours for the Lord" initiative March 9-10 in which many dioceses will have at least one church open for 24 hours, offering eucharistic adoration and the sacrament of reconciliation. See details on page 5.



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Defining the depths of our lives

Our Lord, Jesus of Nazareth, was formed in the living and written tradition of Mosaic Law and the writings of the prophets. In his public ministry, as told by the four Gospels, he would use the words of the prophets to underscore his proclamation of the Kingdom of His Father. At the beginning of holy Lent, the Church offers an exerpt from the Book of Isaiah that images the life of Jesus. As this reading must have formed the Lord Jesus as he grew up in Nazareth, may it continue our formation as missionary disciples of the Lord Jesus and as ambassadors of the Kingdom of God

As you read the words of Isaiah that follow (Isaiah 58. 4b to 8a), ask the Holy Spirit that dwells within you to open your mind and heart to the Will of God, our Father. God speaks through Isaiah, exhorting us: would that TODAY you might fast as to make your voice heard on high! Is this the

manner of fasting I wish...that a man bows his head like a reed, and lie in sackcloth and ashes? Do you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? This rather is the fast that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; setting free the oppressed, breaking every yoke; sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your wound shall

be quickly healed.

Holy Lent is all about conversion of heart (repentance, spiritual conversion). Jesus began his public ministry with this call....change your heart...leave sin behind....seek God's Will and live for God and for neighbor. We have three traditional spiritual disciplines for our Lenten journey...towards the Passion and Easter. These three disciplines are an intensified prayer life, bodily fasting and the works of mercy (both the corporal and the spiritual works of mercy).

These three spiritual and bodily disciplines are to bring the mind and heart together, in recognizing where we have fallen short of God's plan for us (our sin) and what will bring us true happiness...saying YES to God's Will for us. This we do...by following the Way of the Lord Jesus.

A great saint, the Bishop John Chrysostom (d.407) teaches us that there are five aspects of repentance....our conversion of heart. He suggests these for us: (1) to recognize and condemn our own sinfulness (2) to seek

to forgive and forget the wrongs that others have done against us (3) fervent, heart-felt prayer (4) almsgiving, and (5) to live a modest and humble life.

So my friends, as we begin this pilgrimage of holy Lent, looking forward, toward the celebration of His Passion and His Resurrection, let us intensify our prayer. Let us use the bodily discipline of fasting. Let us seek to do both the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. I will take on these three disciplines and I will remember the teaching of St. John Chrysostom...and I ask each of you reading this column to join me with these Lenten disciplines...for one purpose...to free our hearts that we may love God and love neighbor...in the way Jesus lived and lives.

Lenten Regulations

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. This means that we do not eat meat and we have only one full meal.

The other Fridays of the season of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The obligation to abstain from meat binds Catholics 14 years of age and older. The obligation to fast, limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals in the course of the day, binds Catholics from the age of 18 to 59. Those who are younger or older may freely embrace these disciplines. But Lenten disciplines should never endanger your health.

It is obvious that abstaining from meat is meaningless for vegetarians, who must choose some other form of abstinence. It is equally obvious that replacing meat with a gourmet seafood meal is not in keeping with the spirit of Lent.

The 4th Sunday of Lent is rather unique; like the 3rd Sunday of Advent ("Gaudete Sunday"), the 4th Sunday of Lent is a break in an otherwise penitential season. The vestments for this day will be rose, as they are on Gaudete Sunday in Advent, and flowers may adorn the Altar. This day is called "Laetare Sunday" (also "Rose Sunday"), and takes its name from the opening words of the Mass, the Introit's "Laetare, Jerusalem":

Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and come together all you that love her: rejoice with joy, you that have been in sorrow: that you may exult, and be filled from the breasts of your consolation.

Holy Savior Menard, St. Mary's Students march in national life rally in Washington DC

WASHINGTON (Gray DC) -- Huge crowds rallied peacefully in the nation's capital Jan. 22 as part of the annual March for Life.

Many in the crowd are young – teens and twenty-somethings who say they are the pro-life generation.

Students from Holy Savior Menard High School of Alexandria and St. Mary's School in Natchitoches say they wouldn't let the severe winter storm in Louisiana stop them from having their voices heard on Capitol Hill.

"The young people are really taking a stand," said Sonni Tarver, a senior at Menard. Tarver says her faith and family history shaped her views on the issue of abortion.

"I'm adopted - and my mom, my birth mom, had abortions before and after me so it really hits home," said Tarver.

Each January, people from all over the country gather at the nation's capital in peaceful protest against the anniversary of Roe v. Wade. That landmark Supreme Court ruling legalized abortion nationwide. Although that decision stands 45 years later, hope remains for some that things could change.

"To see a lot of people my age and 20-year-olds and coming

out and supporting an event like this. I think it shows a lot for the future of our country and who we are as young people," said Michael Hirchak, a Menard student.

The crowds also drew top Republican leaders, including Speaker of the House Paul Ryan and a live video message from President Donald Trump. Trump's message at the March is the first time in 45 years that a president in office ever spoke at the March. Last year, Vice Presidenet Mike Pence spoke at the march.

"Under my administration, we will always defend the very first right in the Declaration of Independence. And that is the right to life," said the President.

Those at the March for Life say they want to see leaders take more action to end abortion but while they're here they're also hoping to change hearts and minds.

"We all have this common purpose and it's really cool to see all of us come together for this," said Emma Armstrong, from Menard.

Menard students and St. Mary's also spent their time in Washington visiting museums and other monuments. They also made a trip to New York City to see the big apple.

St. Joseph's Altar

In the shadow of St. Patrick's feast day on March 17, St. Joseph's Day (March 19) brings Italian-American communities to the table, quite literally.

The focus is on a St. Joseph's Altar, a feast that includes all sorts of breads, vegetables, egg dishes, pasta and desserts.

It's a time of getting together in thanksgiving. That's because, according to tradition, during a medieval drought and famine, Sicilians prayed to St. Joseph, the patron of workers and the guardian of family. When the famine subsided, they attributed it to the saint and promised to honor him each year with a feast.

When the Catholic Sicilians immigrated to America and settled in New Orleans, the feast quickly grew in popularity.

A typical St. Joseph Altar is always built on a series of three levels corresponding to the Holy Trinity and the traditional three falls of Christ on his way to Calvary. The top level will usually feature a fine statue or picture of St. Joseph.

Because the holiday often falls during Lent, when Catholics forego eating meat, the dishes are all without meat. The complete menu varies a bit by region, but there are some solid staples.

- Pasta -- usually a spaghetti with meatless red sauce and topped with bread crumbs to represent sawdust, a nod to the saint's connection with the working man.
- Fava beans -- associated with good luck because they survived that Sicilian drought, often are given away in dried form to bring good fortune.
- Elaborate breads -- are shaped into biblical symbols such as fish, Joseph's staff, a cross, crown or lamb. A Pupaculova is a bread design that contains a dyed Easter egg which represents the joy of resurrection and eternal life.
- Fruits and vegetables -- in Sicily, it would have been mostly grapes, olives, and figs. But American altars most often include local produce.
- Desserts -- are usually abundantly placed around the altar.

As a token of hospitality, a small bag is prepared for everyone who visits the altar. Each bag may contain a blessed medal or holy card of St. Joseph, a small portion of Pane di Sano Giuseppe (bread of St. Joseph), and an assortment of delicate Italian biscotti or cookies, and the coveted, blessed fava bean.

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More improvements completed to St. Mary's athletic facilities

One thing at a time.

That's the focus that volunteers Chad Methvin, Jason Parker, and Frank Griffin kept at the forefront of their vision during an almost four-year renovation project to the athletic facilities at St. Mary's School in Natchitoches.

And, with patience, persistence, and so many generous donors of money, time, and skill, the girls and boys athletes at St. Mary's School, will be enjoying a new state-of-the-art weight room, locker room, and playing field now, and for years to come.

"We didn't start this project four years ago with the idea of having what we have today," said Chad, a 1996 graduate of St. Mary's. "It all started with a drainage project."

Methvin, Parker, and Griffin, all have children currently attending St. Mary's noticed that every time it rained, the field behind the school flooded making it impossible for the kids to use the playground or the locker room.

"The kids couldn't use the playground for days after it rained," said Parker, a 1992 graduate of Natchitoches Central High and now St. Mary's parent.

"We knew the school didn't have the money to fix it, so we decided to try some other way to get the job done."

Together they visited with St. Mary's alumni and parents of children in the St. Mary's athletic program and asked for donations or anyone with certain skills that could fix the drainage problem.

Before long, a gentleman stepped up with ties to St. Mary's and said he would improve the drainage behind the school making it possible to use the playground and dressing room despite inclement weather.

"The students, parents, teachers, and community immediately noticed the difference that one project made, and the wheels of "what else can we do" started turning," said Chad.

Head football coach Corwyn Aldredge (1980 alum) had been running a successful football program for the past couple years, with St. Mary's football winning the State Championship in 2015 (under the previous Coach Lee Doty) and making the semi-finals on two other occasions.

"Here we were, competing on a state level, and our team had no home field, no dressing room for the visiting team, and no fieldhouse," said Coach Corwyn. "Chad, Jason, Frank, and I talked and we decided to take it a step further."

One thing led to another and before they knew it, plans were made to work on football field to improve it for the junior high and elementary programs.

"Once again, we focused on 'one thing at a time," said Chad. "Let's use what we already have (a field) and get it in playing condition. We found someone to pay for and do the dirt work, then followed by donations for the scoreboard, goalposts, and new lights."

The alumni and friends responded again with generous donations of skill, time, hard work, and, of course, money. But it wasn't always so easy. There were times when the three volunteers wanted to give up on the whole project.

"Tommy Robichaux, chairman of the Diocesan Building Review Committee, encouraged us the whole time -- keeping us on track and not letting us quit," said Chad. "We owe a lot of the success of this project to Tommy."

In the fall of 2016, the junior high football team began playing games on the renovated field, while continuing a search for new bleachers and making future plans for outdoor restroom

facilities. The St. Mary's High School Football team also played the annual fundraiser Steak Supper Football scrimmage in front of record crowd for the first time ever in August 2017 under Friday Night Lights.

With that project nearly completed, the next vision was the renovation of the fieldhouse that girls/guys of all sports could use.

Once again, the trio -- Methvin, Parker, and Griffin along with Coach Corwyn—began soliciting skill, expertise, and funds from parents, alumni, friends, and community leaders, who, once again responded generously.

"It's amazing how generous this community of parents, alumni, and friends are, when it comes supporting St. Mary's School and their children," said Chad.

The renovated fieldhouse, completed in January 2018, includes a 2000 sq. ft. weight room with four new power weight racks and 52 free-standing weights all positioned on a cork-tiled floor. On each side of the weight room are dressing rooms -- one for girls one for guys. Each dressing room is equipped with stained wooden lockers with the name of each

player posted above the locker space. The athletes now enjoy the convenience of showers and restrooms in the dressing rooms -- a convenience they never had until now.

Everyone agrees, the new additions to the St. Mary's athletic facilities are long overdue and are super appreciated.

"As one of the student athletes here in the early 90s, we dreamed of having a facility like this," said Chad. "I'm happy now that my kids will have what we dreamed of 20 years ago."

The cost of the entire project totaled somewhere over \$735,000 -- which all came from outside donations and not a penny from the school or athletic budget.

"We were told at the beginning, that this couldn't be done
-- that others had tried before,"
continued Chad. "But I think they
underestimated the generosity
of the people in this community
and the parents and alumni of this
school.

"It has taken us four years to do this, but we accomplished it slowly, by focusing on one thing at a time," he said. "And for us, it worked!"

15:19 to Paris retells story of thwarting 2015 terrorist attack

True life heroes play themselves in faith-friendly story of self-sacrificing heroism

NEW YORK (CNS) -- The good news about the drama "The 15:17 to Paris" (Warner Bros.), as well as the real-life events on which it's based, is that, given the right circumstances and motivations, ordinary people can achieve great things.

The bad news is that, when they are not doing so, such everyday folks tend to lead lives that are not of much interest to moviegoers.

Thus, the uneven nature of director Clint Eastwood's film recounting the circumstances that led up to the thwarting, in August 2015, of a terrorist attack and potential massacre on the train of the title.

Traveling from Amsterdam to the French capital as tourists, a trio of Americans -- Anthony Sadler, Alek Skarlatos and Spencer Stone, who all portray themselves -- courageously stop a heavily armed jihadist bent on a shooting spree among the captive passengers. In quelling the assailant, Skarlatos and Stone are able to rely on the training they received, respectively, in the Oregon National Guard and the U.S. Air Force.

Stone also uses his knowledge of first aid to keep a griev-

ously wounded fellow traveler alive as the train races to the nearest station.

The portion of the movie devoted to these headline-grabbing incidents is taut and compelling.

But, in adapting the three friends' book about their exploit and their lives before it, written with Jeffrey E. Stern, screenwriter Dorothy Blyskal fails to evoke much interest in the lads' humdrum childhoods and fitful careers.

As kids, they have minor skirmishes with their easily provoked teachers. Once grown, they chat about the ups and downs of their professional lives in a way

that doesn't make eavesdropping on them particularly rewarding. They talk sports, trade gentle insults and, once embarked on their European vacation, debate whether to include Paris in their itinerary. Edge-of-your-seat material this is not.

Still, faith and prayer are shown to be an important part of Stone's life. Twice we see him kneeling at his bedside reciting the "Peace Prayer" often attributed to St. Francis of Assisi. And self-sacrificing heroism is obviously an integral element in the makeup of all three pals.


More honorable than entertaining, "The 15:17 to Paris" reaches an exciting destination. But, in this case at least, getting there turns out to be a good deal less than half the fun.
