U.S. Dioceses urged to have emergency collection for disaster relief

WASHINGTON (CNS)
-- The president of the U.S.
Conference of Catholic Bishops
requested Oct. 2 that U.S. dioceses
take up an emergency collection
to help those devastated by
Hurricane Florence and any other
natural disasters that might occur

the rest of the year.

"We offer our prayers to families who have lost loved ones or are among those injured. As is often the case, the poor are the hardest hit by these conditions, but many will have immense unmet needs," Cardinal Daniel N. DiNardo of Galveston-Houston said in a recent letter to the nation's bishops. Excerpts from his letter were included in a USCCB news release about the need for this collection.

He urged bishops to make this special appeal and that "we each take up the collection as soon as possible so that those most in need can receive assistance quickly."

The cardinal said the staff at the USCCB Office for National Collections in Washington "has been in touch with several bishops to learn about their situations and to offer our prayers and our desire to be of assistance in this time of

need."

Funds will be used for "the humanitarian, long-term recovery and church needs arising from these storms," Cardinal DiNardo said

Initially, funds will be used to support the efforts of Catholic

Charities USA as its staff and volunteers reach out to provide humanitarian aid in the form of water, food, shelter and medical care, as well as the agency's long-term efforts to restore communities after widespread destruction, he explained.

Also, funds will go to support the USCCB's efforts to assist with pastoral and reconstruction aid to the church, Cardinal DiNardo said. "Humanitarian funds for any future disasters impacting communities outside the U.S. may be shared with Catholic

Relief Services for its response efforts," he added.

"The traditional storm season has only just begun and already we have witnessed the devastating impact of Hurricane Florence in the Carolinas," the cardinal said.

Torrential rainfall and catastrophic flooding due to Florence have severely damaged or destroyed "thousands of homes, businesses, and churches," he said. "Given the patterns of recent years, it is reasonable to expect much more unpredictable weather and an increasing number of natural disasters."

At press time, Hurricane Michael made landfall over the Florda Panhandle as a Category 4 storm, resulting in catastrophic damage and leaving 830,000 homes in affected areas without power. Your donations are urgently needed to help those affected.

Political Activity Prohibited

As Election Day 2018 draws nearer, pastors and principals are reminded that any parish, school, or other Church-owned facility is not to be used for any activity related to the support of or opposition to any candidate for political office, nor as places for partisan debate. The pulpit, especially, is never to be used by candidates or incumbents to advance their political views or their positions. Moreover, the pulpit is not to be used as a forum by any individual -- even a priest or deacon -- to support or oppose a candidate, public official, or political position.



October 2008:

MSGR. SUSI DAY - Sister Carla Bertaini, OLS, and Bishop Ronald Herzog present a plaque and keys to the City of Alexandria to Msgr. Joseph Susi during the 3rd annual Challenge Walk/Run held Oct. 11 to benefit St. Mary's Residential Training School. Msgr. Susi was honored at the event for his lifelong ministry in the community, as well as his work with Bishop Greco in getting St. Mary's Training School started in 1954. Today, St. Mary's serves 200 children and young adults with severe and complex developmental disabilities and autism. Msgr. Susi helped lead St. Mary's move to its current campus in the 1970's as well as the expansion into new community homes over the past two years. In fact, one of the new homes on campus is named in his honor. At the age of 92, Msgr. Susi said it would be a great comfort to him to see the debt retired on his St. Mary's group home, a debt that stands at nearly \$400,000.00. For more information, call St. Mary's at 318-445-6443.

October 2018:

St. Mary's Residential Training School continues to meet the needs of children and young adults with developmental disabilities. In 2017, the Louisiana's Knights of Columbus fulfilled their pledge to fund the Monsignor Susi Group Home and renewed their support as St. Mary's broke ground on an additional 15 homes to transition the remaining residents living in dormitories into a true home of their own. St. Mary's is also continuing the tradition of the annual Challenge Walk to support program expenses. This year's Walk was held on April 27, 2018 in Downtown Alexandria.

Feast of the Month: Saint Luke the Evangelist

FRANCISCAN MEDIA - Luke wrote one of the major portions of the New Testament, a two-volume work comprising the third Gospel and Acts of the Apostles. In the two books he shows the parallel between the life of Christ and that of the Church. He is the only Gentile Christian among the Gospel writers. Tradition holds him to be a native of Antioch, and Paul calls him "our beloved physician." His Gospel was probably written between 70 and 85 A.D.



Paul's second journey, remains at Philippi for several years until Paul returns from his third journey, accompanies Paul to Jerusalem, and remains near him when he is imprisoned in Caesarea. During these two years, Luke had time to seek information and interview persons who had known Jesus. He accompanied Paul on the dangerous journey to Rome where he was a faithful companion.

Luke's unique character may best be seen by the emphases of his Gospel, which has been given a number of subtitles:

- 1) The Gospel of Mercy
- 2) The Gospel of Universal Sal-

vation

- 3) The Gospel of the Poor
- 4) The Gospel of Absolute Renunciation
- 5) The Gospel of Prayer and the Holy Spirit
- 6) The Gospel of Joy

Reflection

Luke wrote as a Gentile for Gentile Christians. His Gospel and Acts of the Apostles reveal his expertise in classic Greek style as well as his knowledge of Jewish sources. There is a warmth to Luke's writing that sets it apart

from that of the other synoptic Gospels, and yet it beautifully complements those works. The treasure of the Scriptures is a true gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church.





Tikkun Olam: Repair the World

A transcript of Bishop David Talley's homily delivered at the Red Mass celebrated at St. Francis Xavier Cathedral on September 21, 2018, Feast of St. Matthew; Mass of the Holy Spirit.

We celebrate this Red Mass, a votive Mass of the Holy Spirit, to ask blessing and benediction on the judges and attorneys and legislators and government officials that serve us all in civic leadership. As any student of civics knows, we are founded as a nation as a people ruled by law, and not by kings or princes or moneyed interests. And we seek to honor you today, you who make this concept present in our midst, in your administration of justice.

Interestingly, in the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar, today is the Feast day of St. Matthew. You remember this Apostle of the Lord. Levi held a position of authority in the day of Jesus. He was a tax collector, and he "administered justice"... Rome's

take and his own take, from all who worked. He did this before an itinerant preacher came by and suggested another way of life for him

Last Sunday afternoon, after celebrating a Mass of Confirmation in Deville, I drove down to *Spirits* on Texas Avenue, to take part in the CENLA Homeless Coalition fund-raiser. I had a reserved seat at the table of Fr. Craig Scott and his team from St. Rita's. There was a fine band there, with great drinks and delicious burgers. There was a silent auction, to raise funds for this important work.

After a kind soul bought me a drink, and after I spoke with Kendra Gauthier, the extraordinary woman behind the recent successes of the CENLA Homeless Coalition, I went for the burgers. And then I sat down and I talked ... but mostly I listened.

YES, it was a fund-raiser for the CENLA Homeless Coalition and that's a good thing. YES, Spirits can whip up a delicious burger and a satisfying drink and that's a good thing. But do you know what the best part was for me last Sunday afternoon? It was being in a room-full of folks that seemed to be walking in the direction I'm hoping to walk.

Now, the room wasn't full of Catholics. We were there of course but there were good Methodists and Baptists present, maybe even a Pentecostal or two. There may have been a man or woman of the Covenant, maybe a follower of Islam. There may have been several *none of the above* present with us. Not sure. We weren't wearing religious uniforms ... except for me.

I didn't have any deep theological discussion there-it wasn't that kind of gathering. Still, for me, the gathering of men and women at Spirits was an extraordinary experience of the Lord's Presence in the here and now. *Why so? How so?*

With the CENLA Homeless Coalition serving as a catalyst, gathered together purposefully and spoke the truth about what we see outside our car windows each day, what we know to be the truth, hidden from our regular lives: the open wound of homelessness, pockets of deep unemployment in some neighborhoods; drug abuse, every kind of abuse; broken families and broken homes and broken hearts; untreated issues of body and mind and spirit. What we see in the anawin-what we see in the poorest ones-that drift in and out of our managed world daily and what we don't want to admit to ourselves is A PROFOUND SENSE OF BEING UTTERLY ALONE IN THE FIGHT TO REMAIN SANE



How do we know what readings to read?

One of the most fascinating things that many do not know about the Catholic Church is the fact that every church parish uses the same scripture passages for their Sunday Mass(es). So whether you attend Mass at your local church parish or you are visiting Rome and get a chance to snap a picture with Pope Francis, your local priest (or deacon) will be preaching on the same scripture as the Holy Father. The homily (for better or worse) will of course vary, but not the sacred scripture.

I suppose this is so fascinating for me because I find it difficult at times to get a small group of people to remember a meeting, much less get tens of thousands of churches in multiple languages to read the same readings on their appointed days. So this month's question: "How do priests know what readings to read and what color to wear at Mass?"

The answer to both of these questions is found in the ever important "Ordo" (pronounced awr-doh). This is a small paperback book found in most sacristies (where the priest and deacon prepares for Mass) and it lists many details about

the day based on the liturgical calendar. Among other important information such as proper prayers to pray for the day, a brief history of the saint(s) of the day, are the options for readings and the colors to be worn during the Mass. For daily Masses, there are often options for readings (such as feast days) which the priest can choose to use.

During daily Mass, I cannot help but chuckle when the priest has opted to use a different reading than is found in the Mass leaflet and people start turning the pages thinking they are on the wrong day or that the priest made a mistake. No mistake was made, the priest just chose a different Mass setting.

If you ever get the chance to look at an ordo, just be warned

that it is filled with abbreviations that can be a bit tricky to decipher. However, knowing how we are all united in one voice for the Lord hopefully helps you appreciate the universality of the Catholic Church and in turn help you "Love the Liturgy".

Next month we will talk more about the liturgical calendar and how the Church systematically compiles the readings in such a way that most of the Bible is covered in a three-year cycle... and they say Catholics don't read the Bible...

achievement. Each candidate is nominated by members of the community and are selected by the YWCA Board of Directors.



In these difficult days, it seems like we ... are ... so alone ... in dealing with the insanity and the incivility and the inhumanity that is all around us, broadcast 24 hours a day and filling the Internet with vitriol and violence WITH BOTH DEMOCRATIC AND REPUBLICAN PUNDITS SPEWING OUT POISON. If you have eyes to see and a heart to comprehend you know about this brokenness and about this political poison on all sides.

The gaggle of folks that joined together at Spirits last Sunday, we had a common desire, a common heart whether it was articulated or not. With the CENLA Homeless Coalition as our catalyst...we gathered, hoping to repair the world. YES, it seems awfully lonely as we strive to be civil, to be sane, to be fully human when the whole world is screaming *look* at me...deal with me....it's ALL about me. But, as dark as it is we must begin again ... together ... repairing the world.

TIKKUN OLAM: a Hebrew concept many of you are familiar with, it is the desire and the longing and the will to actively repair the world as the Creator desires. The world as we experience it here and now is not the design of the Creator. But what I recognized as a movement of the Lord at Spirits gives me hope. TIKKUN OLAMour longing to repair the worldto be instruments of the Creator,

To repair the world we inhabit in central Louisiana, we must be in this fight together, fighting for the sanity and the civility and the humanity we long for. You who are honored today by this assembly: The honored judges, the honored attorneys, the honored legislators and government officials. You and we are in this fight together andit is a fight-against the darkness of insanity and incivility and inhumanity. Chaos is not to be our

NOW, if we come to hear our personal faith tradition speak beautifully and lovingly about the invisible God, but does not speak of loving God's own creation, or the humanity that is God's image and likeness ARE YOU TRULY **LOVING THE CREATOR?**

From the sad days of exile when Jerusalem was crushed, the holy Temple razed to the ground and most of its citizens forcemarched to another distant land IN THE EAST, the prophetic voice of Isaiah cried out: So, you love God, do you? and to show your love and sorrow for your sin, you fast.

But ... Do you not know that this is the fasting that God desires: releasing those bound unjustly, setting free the oppressed, sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless, clothing the naked when you see them. THEN ... THEN your light shall break forth like the dawn and your wound quickly healed.

What is this wound that

Isaiah mentions, our wound ... the wound that Jesus of Nazareth seeks to heal? There is a wound of isolation ... thinking only of oneself, alone, completely alone, not part of a family, or a history, or a community, or a people. There is a wound of self-centeredness untouched by the law of the land or the building up of the common good for the good of all but always self-referential, self-seeking. There is a wound of separation: we are meant for God, we are meant for one another. We are relational creatures as the living God is relational. But when we build cocoons of safety and security so that we will not see or hear or feel or fathom the cry of another, we are lost to ourselves. We worship

idols, not the living God. The One that many of us follow, Jesus of Nazareth, speaks about the two great commandments of loving God and loving neighbor. The path for humanity to follow, taught by the Lord Jesus, who embodies the fullness of the law, presents us the Way of Life-the Way of redeeming and fruitful life-one that is not about isolation or self centeredness or separation. In fact, this wandering rabbi, who was making Tikkun olam ... repairing the world ... indeed the cosmos ... his life's work, tells us that we, this congregation today, this respected gathering of jurists and advocates and legislators, this group honored by Christ's Church today, and the clerics and congregation that honor you-we together are called to be one in repairing the

earth, sanely, civilly, humanely, according to the design given by the Creator hidden in the depths of our nature.

During the great Depression (of a bygone era), with the aftereffects of the dust bowl out west and the great collapse of moneyed interests in Washington and New York felt by all there was a folk song made popular and sung sarcastically that spoke of the Lord, of the living God, as giving you pie in the sky when you die. The singing reformer saw religion as a dream-world-a false piety ... an illusion.

That was then. Today for example, with the horror that the Catholic Church is experiencing, when civil authorities and attorneys and jurists (gratefully) have uncovered hundreds of cases, showing that many of our priests and many of our bishops-these consecrated men of God-sexually abused thousands of children and teens ... we Catholics sit in sack cloth. We seethe with anger and are weighed down in shame and sorrow and confusion. Though these bishops and priests seen in their immorality and criminal behavior are a very small percentage of those of us who serve the Lord, still ... still, this great evil has greatly diminished our credibility as Evangelists, in the eyes of many. And apart from this current scandal, the young teens and twenty-somethings among us just shrug their shoulders ... like ... what does this talk of God or of the common good or any good mean anyway, to me? And we, we who have the gift of faith, we who are intentional in our discipleship, our faith traditions, we too have constructed safe and secure cocoons - cocoons that keep us happily at peace with our own

theology and our own identity but apart from the solidarity needed to repair the world.

So, with all the brokenness and rage that you see in the courts and government offices each day, with all that the faithful see each day, where do we go ... what do we do?

This Red Mass honors you in your administration of justice. The red color of the vestment I wear is in honor of the great breath of God-the Spirit that blows through us, within us, as promised by the prophets and by the Son. Though tempted to give in or give up as insanity and incivility and inhumanity seem the cause de jour, I challenge you, I challenge us to believe in the goodness that we know, the truth that we seek and the beauty that lifts our hearts. Let us replace the vitriol and violence of cable TV and the halls of government and the neighborhood streets of our cities and towns with this great work -Tikkun Olam. Let us join together to repair the world in and through each person we are privileged to serve. This is intentional discipleship. This is Christ the Lord, alive, living in and through us, He, the Vine of Life, we, His branches.

I suggest following these steps to find your patron saint.

The first step is probably the most obvious: pray about it. Ask Jesus if there is a certain saint He has in mind for your family. Whose intercession would be most beneficial? Whose example would be the most influential? Take this petition to Mass, to adoration, to your rosary, to your prayer time as a family. Be patient with the Lord and explore His promptings toward certain

2. Look at Your Individual **Patrons**

Another way to select a patron saint for your family is by noting your family members' patron saints. Is anyone named after a saint? Who are the confirmation saints in the family? Perhaps there is a running theme or a certain saint that strikes everyone.

3. Observe Your Family's Experience, Devotions, and **Interests**

Perhaps your patron saint will find you via your family's individual life events and enjoyments. Has your family been through a trial during which you relied heavily on a certain saint's intercession? Maybe your struggle with fertility, unemployment, lack of community, illness, or moving will bring forth your patron saint. Does your family have a shared

devotion? Your love for the Liturgy of the Hours, the Sacred Heart, or Divine Mercy may lead you to your patron. Does your family share a hobby? Activities like sports, education, travel, reading, and cooking have been enjoyed by saints for centuries. Look to your family's shared human experience and you will find several saints there waiting for you.

4. Pray a Novena

Once you have an idea of who your patron saint might be, pray a novena to that saint as a family. Read about the saint's life and explore their virtues together as a family. This will help solidify your confidence in that particular saint's patronage while immersing your family in their life, stories, miracles, and legacy.

5. Let Chance Decide

But what happens if you still can't decide on a patron saint? If there is a divide in the family over who should be your patron, if there are pillow fights occurring and a stalemate encountered, you have a couple of options:

- 1. If you've narrowed it down to a few saints, but just need help with the final decision, write their names on separate pieces of paper, say a prayer for guidance, and draw from a hat.
- 2. Use a tool like the Saint's Name Generator to randomly select your family's patron saint. Say a little prayer together beforehand to be open to whomever you select. You can also do this at the beginning of each year to select a saint for your family to learn about and imitate during that year.

Ultimately, you can't go wrong! So don't stress if you're not able to agree and don't worry about selecting "the perfect saint." All the saints are perfect for your family because the saints' intercession is perfect. This should be fun and valuable for your family, so enjoy the process and relish your family's



National Vocations Awareness Week encourages young people to encounter Christ

WASHINGTON—The Catholic Church in the United States will celebrate National Vocation Awareness Week, Nov. 4-10. This annual event is a special time for parishes in the U.S. to foster a culture of vocations for the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life.

Pope Francis, in his message for the 2018 World Day of Vocations, emphasized that it is at the loving initiative of God, and by His personal encounter with each of us, that one is called. "Even amid these troubled times, the mystery of the Incarnation reminds us that God continually comes to encounter us. He is God-with-us, who walks along the often dusty paths of our lives. He knows our anxious longing for

love and he calls us to joy. In the diversity and the uniqueness of each and every vocation, personal and ecclesial, there is a need to listen, discern and live this word that calls to us from on high and,

while enabling us to develop our talents, makes us instruments of salvation in the world and guides us to full happiness."

National Vocation Awareness Week, sponsored by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations, is designed to help promote vocation awareness and to encourage young people to ask the question: "To what vocation in life is God calling me?" Parish and school communities across the nation are encouraged to include, during the first week in November, special activities that focus on vocation awareness and provide opportunities for discernment.

Contemporary society is all too often saturated by constant activity and noise, so it is important this week to encourage young discerners to take time for silent, contemplative prayer. Cardinal Joseph Tobin, Chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Clergy,

Consecrated Life and Vocations echoes states: "Quiet reflection and prayer are essential elements for vocational discernment. It is in the interior depths of our heart where we hear the voice of Christ, where he speaks to us, and where he reveals his will for our lives."

Observance of Vocation Awareness Week began in 1976 when the U.S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for the celebration. It was later moved to the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord in January. The USCCB Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations moved the observance of National Vocation Awareness Week to November to engage Catholic schools and colleges more effectively in this effort.

Actress O'Neill, Praising God's Mercy, highlights Gift of Life Banquet

Jennifer O'Neill told the story with tears of a time long ago when she "folded" under pressure - pressure from her husband at the time, her doctor, and a friend -- and had an abortion.

"My doctor told me it (the fetus) was a gob of tissue, a cluster of cells," said the Brazilian-born American actress, widely known for her role in the 1971 film "Summer of '42." Her husband at the time, whom she described as a "man of some power on Wall Street," rather than being excited with the news of her pregnancy, immediately began pressuring her to have an abortion.

"A friend even told me, 'Abortion is easy.""

The procedure wasn't as easy as advertised, she said, and in the aftermath, "I deeply and profoundly hated myself.

It took a long time for her to heal, but it happened, she said, thanks to God's mercy.

"If you allow God to heal you, you become the billboard for truth," the white-haired, 70-year-old O'Neill said to cheers and applause from close to 300 people at the inaugural Gift of Life Fundraising Banquet for the Cenla Pregnancy Center, which opened in Alexandria last December.

The banquet, which was held at Calvary Baptist Church's Calvary Hall on September 11, netted approximately \$85,000.

With more than 37 years in modeling and acting, O'Neill,

of Nashville, Tennessee, has been through eight divorces and several miscarriages, but she has been married to the same man (Mervin Sidney Loque) for 22 years and has three children and four grandchildren.

O'Neill works tirelessly to raise funds, direct short films and make media appearances on behalf of pro-life efforts. Her recent work with "Project Abortion: The Untold Story" led to her speaking engagement in Alexandria.

"You are involved with a top A organization," O'Neill told the crowd, praising the CPC as "one of the best" pregnancy centers in the country. "I want to be a part of this. God's plan is to bring all His children to Him, and how wonderful it is that you are showing how that can be done, bringing Baptists and Catholics and people of other faiths together, working for one great cause.

"Can you imagine if in our country there was as unified a vision as there is here, it would be the end of abortion. With this combined effort, it's going to happen."

Auto dealership Dallas Hixson gave a heartfelt testimony to the crowd about how his mother's decision not to have an abortion allowed him to live a life of mission for God.

Pastor Brian Gunter, the board president for the CPC, and the center's executive director, Claire Lemoine, also rallied the crowd with inspiring pro-life messages.

Gunter praised overwhelming community support for the center, which is located next to the Baptist Building on MacArthur Drive and which has served more than 130 mothers to date. Gunter and George Hardy, the center's fundraising chairman, each were presented with special awards at the banquet for their work with the center.

More than 200 churches of several Christian denominations have worked together to establish and support the non-profit pregnancy center to provide compassionate support to women and men faced with difficult pregnancy decisions.

"God has had His hand in every aspect of this ministry,"

Lemoine said. "The devil does not want the Cenla Pregnancy Center to exist, but every morning before starting our day when we bow our heads, go to our Lord, present him our needs and surrender every aspect of the center to Him, including ourselves, the devil flees."

"He knows the power of Jesus is one that will conquer evil and conquer his desire to steal, kill and destroy," she went on, 'and He knows that within the walls of the pregnancy center, Jesus is present."

Radio Maria Pilgrimage to the Holy Land

A group of thirteen pilgrims, mostly from the Diocese of Alexandria but ranging from as far afield as Costa Rica, recently traveled to the Holy Land with Fr. Emilio Garreaud, the National Director of Radio Maria USA.

Between Aug. 14-21, we walked in the footsteps of Our Lord. As Fr. Emilio constantly reminded us, it was here, in this place, that God became man, died for our sins, and rose again to bring us to eternal life. But as our guide Tony informed us, even as he made the history come alive,

our Christian brethren there are in desperate straits.

During two days in the region of Galilee in the north and four days around Jerusalem, Bethlehem and the Dead Sea in the south, we saw and touched places where many of the key events of the life of Christ and the early Church occurred including the grotto of the Annunciation in Nazareth and the place of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem; the sites of his first public miracle at Cana and of his discourse on the Bread of Life at Capernaum; the multiplication of the loaves and fishes at Tabgha; and the

Transfiguration atop Mount Tabor. We walked the Palm Sunday route; beheld the Upper Room of the Last Supper - and of the first Pentecost; prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane where he was betrayed; stood in the courtyard where Peter denied him three times; walked the length of the Via Dolorosa; touched the naked Rock of Calvary; knelt in the empty Tomb of the Holy Sepulchre; and scaled the summit of the Mount of Olives from which He ascended to heaven. We were there! In those places!

Throughout, our awesome Israeli guide provided rich insights into the depths and wonders of our Faith, and much more. Anton "Tony" Azraq is a Melkite Catholic whose family has resided in Jerusalem for at least 1400 years. He is also

a Biblical archaeologist who discoursed with authority on the places we saw - and with great passion about the sad state of Christianity in its very homeland. For myself, the moving experience of being in the Holy Land will be forever linked with the shocking realization of how little we here in the west know of the harsh reality facing our Christian brethren there. The greatest tragedy is what is happening in Bethlehem where since the 2000-2005 Palestinian Intifada, or uprising, Israel was compelled to erect the West Bank Security Wall. Christians have been trapped between Israelis who regard them as Palestinians, and increasingly radical Muslims who consider them Israeli collaborators. The result has been catastrophic. In a decade and a half, Bethlehem

has dropped from 80 percent to 20 percent Christian, with the Muslim population exploding. Denied work by their Muslim neighbors, the Bethlehemite Christians depend on religious tourism for their very livelihood but remain just one Intifada away from being eradicated entirely. They need our presence, support, and prayers now more than ever.

broker, Pilgrimage, packed a great deal into an incredibly short time more than was promised on the itinerary they provided, more than could possibly be conveyed in these few words. It was a whirlwind of experiences that we will be a long time fully processing but will never forget. There, in that place, the land of his birth, the great events of the life of Christ became real even as we came to understand the tragic conditions his followers, our brethren, face. Pray for the peace of Jerusalem, yes -- but pray also for the peace of Bethlehem.

If you ever get a chance to go on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land – Do not pass it up! You will come away spiritually enriched, and your Christian brethren there will gain reassurance that they are not forgotten.

"The V Encuentro national convention for Hispanic/Latino ministry leaders was a wonderful

ecclesiastical experience of communion," says Father Peter Faulk, who attended the conference along with Father Adam Travis, and over 3,000 delegates representing more than 165 dioceses in the United States.

The V Encuentro's main goal is "to discern ways in

which the Church in the United States can better respond to the Hispanic/Latino presence, and to strengthen the ways in which Hispanics/Latinos respond to the call to the New Evangelization as missionary disciples serving the entire Church," the event's documents state.

Pope Francis spoke via video message, where he exhorted all Catholics in the United States to "not sit on the sidelines" as if "looking down from a balcony," but to participate fully and vigorously in living the Gospel and to take up the challenge of building unity in the human family."






