Catholic All Year: Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving



During the season of Lent, the Church asks us to focus on prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

I used to labor under what I think is a pretty common misconception about Lent: that we are supposed to be miserable for forty days. How wrong I was! Lent is not a time to try

to punish ourselves into being deserving of God's grace, but a time to grow closer to God; to take up new practices that lead us toward Him and to leave behind practices that distract us from Him.

The easiest way for me to understand it, and to be able

to explain it to my kids, is by thinking about the concept of attachment. Jesus tells us, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matthew 6:21).

Our goal as Christians is to be attached to God and the things of heaven, and to be *detached* from sin and the things of the world. That doesn't mean that we can't enjoy the things of the world, but that we shouldn't feel as if we would not be able to survive without them.

Things such as coffee, sweets, social media, phones, TV, and even our food, homes, and cars aren't sinful in and of themselves, and it's perfectly acceptable to enjoy them. But once we start to see them as things that we require, or things that we deserve rather than gifts from God to be used in service of Him, we've formed an attachment. The season of Lent is a perfect time to detach ourselves from these things.

Lent is a time not of suffering for its own sake, but of increased focus on God and others, and decreased focus on self and personal comfort.

The stereotypical thing is normally to give up chocolate for Lent. And perhaps, for a particular person in a particular year that might be an efficacious choice. But if you're looking for a new idea to try growing in holiness this lent, we've listed sixty-six ideas for things to consider giving up or taking up, at beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels. These ideas can be used for children or adults.

'Shocking' ignorance on Real Presence prompts eucharistic congress

OAKLAND, Calif. (CNS) --Fewer than one-third of Catholics believe the Eucharist is the actual body and blood of Jesus Christ, the Pew Research Center found in a recent poll.

The majority of America's self-identified Catholics -- 69 percent, according to the poll -- are either ignorant or simply mistaken about what the Catholic Church teaches on the Eucharist and the Real Presence.

"As bishop of the Diocese of Oakland, I find this shocking," Bishop Michael C. Barber wrote in a letter to the faithful.

As part of the bishop's response to the findings, he has called for a diocesanwide eucharistic congress June 19-20 at the Cathedral of Christ the Light in Oakland.

"With the theme 'Stay with us, Lord!' (Luke 24:29), I invite all the faithful of our diocese to reflect upon the centrality of the Eucharist in our lives, and to reaffirm our call to be a people nourished, fed and molded by the Eucharist itself -- just as the disciples were on the road to Emmaus," Bishop Barber wrote.

The June 19 portion of the event is designed for priests of the diocese. They will gather to hear a spiritual talk, hear from the bishop and will pray with young people of the diocese, who will lead eucharistic adoration until 11:00 p.m.

This will give "a chance for the priests to pray with the young people of our diocese, and a chance for the young to experience the faith of our priests," said Father Brandon Macadaeg, rector of the Cathedral

of Christ the Light.

"In this generation, the love for Eucharist and eucharistic adoration is prevalent," he said. In parishes he has served and introduced eucharistic adoration, he has seen its transformative effective on young people and families.

The June 20 portion will be a day of prayer, speakers and Masses, in both English and Spanish, with a public procession of the Blessed Sacrament on the streets bordering the cathedral.

The Saturday event is aimed at engaging and inspiring the faithful, according to the planning committee, made up of priests, deacons and laypeople. The day will begin at 9:00 a.m. with a talk in English by Franciscan University-educated evangelist Michael Gormley from Texas, followed by Mass celebrated by Bishop Barber.

After the Mass, attendees will begin a procession that will depart the cathedral to carry the Eucharist around the city blocks bordering the cathedral. Those planning to attend the Spanishlanguage track are invited to the cathedral plaza to take part in the procession.

The procession will mark the end of the English-language track. Jesse Romero, author, radio host and evangelist, will address the Spanish-speaking audience in the cathedral. Bishop Barber will follow Romero's talk by celebrating Mass in Spanish.

Volunteers will be needed for hospitality and in assisting with the procession. Assistance is being sought from the Order of Malta and the Knights of Columbus. Children who have received their first Communion in 2020 are invited to attend wearing their garments from that special day.

Father Macadaeg attended the International Eucharistic Congress in the Philippines in 2016, along with Bishop Barber and about 100 people from the diocese, including priests, religious and laypeople. What can a eucharistic congress bring to the Diocese of Oakland?

"We know we will succeed when we build a culture of prayer around the Congress," Father Macadaeg told The Catholic Voice, Oakland's diocesan newspaper. "The culture of prayer," he said, "that's where miracles happen. That's where the Spirit begins to move."

The Oakland Diocese's eucharistic congress committee has put together resources for prayer, such as how to conduct a Holy Hour. The materials are available at https://oakdiocese.org/eucharistic-congress.

"We do ask people to pray for the success of the congress," he said. Some parishes will conduct a Holy Hour for the intentions of the congress.

Those unable to attend the eucharistic congress, he suggested, might be able to spend an hour of Adoration in their own parish. "Be with us in that regard," he said.

The congress provides opportunity for the diocese to become a "powerhouse of prayer," he said. "Here's a chance for us to do this."

He noted that Bishop Barber's request for prayers during Advent were well received. A culture of prayer across the diocese could grow from that.

"Can we pray for each other, although we may not be in each other's presence, or know who each other are?" Father Macadaeg said. "An intentional group of disciples praying with each other, for it each other. It's powerful."

Practicing silence and solitude

In the past year, I've read so much about the need for silence and solitude. I've always been left inspired to do it, but the question remained: what does silence and solitude actually look like?

If you've ever tried calming your mind and heart, you know that about 3 minutes in, you start thinking about the windows that need a good scrub, or the errand you forgot to run the day before. Here are a few tips to practice silence and solitude in this next season. Remember, there's nothing magical about January 1. If you've found yourself in need of a reset with the Lord this year, take this Lenten season to realign your mind and heart with His

1. Recognize the value.

If we don't value something, we won't prioritize it. We need to mentally prepare and know that time in silience and solitude is important for our health and

relationship with the Lord. This time has value; you may not be physically checking something off of your to-do list, so instinct might seem to tell you that it's a waste of time. It's not. Let's make setting time aside in stillness a priority.

2. Get alone.

Even if it's for just a few minutes, we need to set time to be completely alone and still. We can't truly practice stillness and solitude with a toddler next to us or in a room full of people. In order to take care of those around us, we need to prioritize getting alone to do a heart-check

and really listen to what the Lord has to say for us.

3. Get away from the noise.

Getting alone implies that we will get away from noise, but there are other distractions that still fight for our attention. A cell phone in arms reach, even music. We must create space for God to speak to us. When we step away and clear out the noise, we tell God "I'm ready to listen."

4. Fill your mind insteading of fighting to empty it.

Fighting to completely empty our minds can start a neverending battle. So, let's choose wiser and try to fill our minds.

Do this by medidating on a short verse. Repeat it. Recognize each word, and let the meaning take root. If you have a hard time memorizing Scripture, try beginning simply with just the name of Jesus. Repeat it and focus on Him, allowing Him space to speak back. Ask God questions. And give Him room to answer.

Journal. Write out anything and everything that comes into your mind, so that God can fill that space with His peace.

5. Schedule it.

Put on your calendar a time to have daily solitude and silence,


and maybe even try to practice longer periods of solitude once per month or quarter. Try just 5 minutes a day and increase as you can. Set a timer on your phone and make it a practice.

If you are feeling particularly disconnected from God, don't feel discouraged. We simply cannot expect to experience soul deep connection with our Heavenly Father when we are constantly connected to the world (kids, work, screens, and all the rest). But, God's generosity will not be outdone. Let us continue to approach the Father with arms open to receive everything He has in store for us.

Listening to the Lord in a noisy world



I remember a time when the television stations would play the National Anthem late each evening and then go off the air until the next morning. Now, we have 24-hour news coverage and hundreds of channels, and can usually find something that piques our interest at any time of the day or night. Another big distraction is social media. One report I read states that those people on social media spend over two hours per day on social meda. I am sure there are people who multitask and check their Facebook while watching television.

When there were only landline telephones, going camping for the weekend or on vacation meant that you were unavailable to communicate with the outside world for days on end. With the advancement

of cell phones, we now have the capability to speak with anyone, just about anywhere, and at any time. This was proven to me this past winter when I called someone to follow up on a meeting. He answered his cell phone with a whisper, and said, "Hey Deacon, can I call you back? I'm on my deer stand." I suppose one could argue that it is safer to always be able to contact someone in the event of an emergency, but it also proves that it is difficult to escape the noises in our life.

However, to strengthen our faith, we must find a way to spend quiet time in prayer. Prayer is more than sending up our intentions and needs to the Lord. In 1 Samuel 3:10, Samuel does NOT say, "Listen, Lord,

your servant is speaking." No, Samuel says, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." God speaks to us in a still, quiet voice that can only be heard when we are quiet.

We also read in the Gospels that Jesus went off to pray... to listen to the message of the Father. We, too, must find a place of solitude, a sacred space for us to go and listen for the Lord's message to us.

Let's journey this Lenten season with Jesus, find your "desert place" to practice being quiet (yes, it does take practice), and enter into deeper prayer. Designate a specific place in your house that is away from noise and distractions. Consider participating in a "holy hour" or adoration at your church parish.

Time spent with the Lord in silent prayer is worth the sacrifice.

It is good if you can do this each day, but especially important when entering into the church and preparing yourself for the start of Mass. Taking a few minutes to settle your mind, offer your intentions, and then quiet your thoughts will help to prepare you to receive the Lord's message when listening to scripture, receiving Him in the Eucharist, and will help you to Love the Liturgy!

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

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What to give up and take up for Lent

During the season of Lent, the Church asks us to focus on prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Here are sixty-six ideas to consider giving up or taking up for Lent, at beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels.

- 1. Don't take the best spot available in the parking lot.
- 2. Take the worst parking spot you can find.
- 3. Don't drive; walk or take public transportation.
- 1. Make your bed every day.
- 2. Make your bed every day before you leave your bedroom.
- 3. Make other people's beds too.
- 1. Go to daily Mass once per week in addition to Sunday Mass.
- 2. Go to daily Mass two or three times per week.
- 3. Go to daily Mass every day.
- 1. Don't leave dishes in the sink overnight.
- 2. Do the cooking dishes before dinner and the dinner dishes immediately after dinner.
- 3. Don't use the dishwasher.
- 1. Buy only things written on your shopping list.
- 2. Keep a shopping list and shop only once per week.
- 3. Don't buy anything during Lent except the necessities.
- 1. Don't eat out at restaurants.
- 2. Make your food from scratch.
- 3. Grow or raise all your own food.



- 1. Don't watch TV or movies alone.
- 2. Watch TV or movies only as a whole-family activity.
- 3. Don't watch TV or movies.
- 1. Give up one social media platform.
- 2. Check social media just once per day.
- 3. Remove all social media apps from your devices.
- 1. Say a family Rosary once a week
- 2. Say one decade of the Rosary as a family each day.
- 3. Say a family Rosary every day.
- 1. Listen only to audiobooks or classical music in the car.
- 2. Turn off the radio in the car.

- 3. Say a Rosary in the car or listen to a spiritual audiobook.
- 1. Be in bed for a set amount of tie each night.
- 2. Go to bed and get up at specific times each day.
- 3. And don't bring your phoen with you (get an alarm clock).
- 1. Get dressed before 8:00 a.m.
- 2. Don't wear workout clothes (unless you're working out).
- 3. Wear clothes that make you feel put together every day.
- 1. Have dinner as a family.
- 2. Have a family game night.
- 3. Read a book aloud as a family.
- 1. Make regular social phone calls to friends or relatives.

- 2. Write regular letters to friends
- 3. Make regular visits to friends or relatives.
- 1. Know what you're going to make for dinner by 10:00 a.m.
- make for dinner by 10:00 a.m. 2. Start a meal-planning system.
- 3. Teach your kids to plan meals and cook.
- 1. Have the house clean before Sunday each week.
- 2. Have the house clean before bed each night.
- 3. Have the house clean before dinner each evening.
- 1. Eat up the food that's in the back of your pantry and freezer.
- 2. Eat only soup for dinner.
- 3. Observe the voluntary recommended weekday Lenten fast.

- 1. Give up one type of treat.
- 2. Eat desserts only in company.
- 3. Give up all sweets.
- 1. Switch from coffee to tea or vice versa.
- 2. Limit yourself to one cup of coffee or tea per day.
- 3. Give up caffeine.
- 1. Turn the lights off in empty rooms.
- 2. Have lights turned on in only one room at a time.
- 3. Don't use electricity.
- 1. Say the Morning Offering when you wake up.
- 2. And say the Angelus at noon.
- 3. And do an examination of consceience and say the Act of Contrition at night.
- 1. Read the Sunday readings before Mass.
- 2. Read the Bible each day.
- 3. Read the Catechism each day.
- 1. If you live TV, read a novel instead.
- 2. If you like novels, read a classic.
- 3. If you like the classics, read great Catholic nonfiction.

Tithing: the what, why, and how of it all

Tithing is such an important act in supporting the work of the Church. Yet, it can sometimes be a sensitive topic. After all, it can be uncomfortable, and maybe even confusing, when you feel like you have to give a portion of your hard-earned money on a regular basis. So, let's dive in to what tithing is, why it's important, and how to go about tithing, whether you're already giving or have never previously considered giving of your time, talent, and treasure,

What is tithing?

The word tithe comes from an old English word meaning "a tenth part." In the very first book of the Bible, we read the words from Jacob: "This stone that I have set up as a sacred pillar will be the house of God. Of everything you give me, I will return a tenth part to you without fail" (Genesis 28:22).

We also read in Leviticus (27: 30, 32) that "All tithes of the land, whether in grain from the fields or in fruit from the trees, belong to the Lord; they are sacred to the Lord... the tithes of the herd and flock, every tenth animal that passes under the herdsman's rod, shall be sacred to the Lord."

Traditionally, individuals and families are asked to give 10 percent of their income as a tithe, but there is not a specific

percentage of our wealth that we are mandated to give. What is important is that we give what we are able, and give from our heart. This act of selfless giving reminds us that all we have is given to us from God.

Why do we tithe?

Tithing is a recognition that all we have originally comes from God and will return to Him. One day we will be called to answer to how we have spent our time, talent, and treasure.

It is not entirely about how much we give, but that we make the sacrifice of giving. Remember the widow in Luke 21:1-4?

"When he looked up, he saw some wealthy people putting their offerings into the treasury and he noticed a poor widow putting in two small coins. He said. 'I tell you truly, this poor widow put in more than all the rest; for those others have all made offerings from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has offered her whole livelihood."

What matters isn't so much the amount that we give, but that we make the sacrifice of giving.

Where should our tithe money go?

Our Parish

If you're new to tithing and are unsure of where to start, start with your local church. "A parish is a definite community of the Christian faithful established on a stable basis within a particular church...it is the place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. The parish initiates the Christian people into the ordinary expression of the liturgical life... it teaches Christ's saving doctrine; it practices the charity of the Lord in good works and brotherly love" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 2179).

Other efforts

If you don't have a home church parish, or would like to give a portion of your tithe to other causes, consider the things you are enthusiastic about and that are authentically doing God's work. Take a look at the organizations that have made a meaningful impact of your spiritual life. Other efforts might include a local pregnancy center, soup kitchen, youth ministry, or even an individual missionary or missionary family.

You can also consider ideas that might be somewhat outside of the box, including giving to an individual college student, or commissioning a work of art for your church parish.

Most importantly, just ask the Holy Spirit where He is leading you to give. He will point you in the right direction.

On Thursday, March 19, Our Lady of Prompt Succor Church in Alexandria will celebrate a High Holy Mass of St. Pio of Pietrelcina at 5:30 p.m., followed by a presentation at 6:30 p.m. about the Casa USA project prayer groups.

Parish Spotlight: St. Joseph Church, Colfax Established 1897

The first mass celebrated in Colfax was offered in a private home by Fr. Leonard Menard, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church in Alexandria. The mission was attended periodically by Fr. Jean Marie Beaulieu of Cloutierville from 1880 till 1890.

A church building was completed in January, 1893, on land given by Captain C. H. Teal. In 1897, Bishop Durier established St. Joseph's as an independent parish. No resident priest could remain until a rectory was built in 1909. St. Joseph's was a mission of Alexandria from 1906 through 1908. After a rectory was provided, Bishop Van de Ven appointed Fr. J. M. Blaine as the first pastor. Fr. William Lambertz, a native of Germany, succeeded him. In 1934, Fr. M. Maure was named pastor.

On May 26, 1936, construction of a new levee near the Red River caused the removal of the church from its original site. Fr. Vincent Couvillion was responsible for extensive renovations of the church and rectory from 1943 to 1945.



Desmond rededicated the church after its renovation in 1944.

1947, Bishop Greco invited the Fathers of the Precious Blood to administer the parish and its missions. The Fathers also brought three teaching sisters who

opened a school on the grounds in buildings secured by the bishop from former army bases in the area. By 1949, the Colfax church served three missions in Fishville, Montgomery and Aloha. Of these only St. Patrick's in Montgomery remains as a mission of the original parent church. The Precious Blood Fathers were forced to consolidate their numbers after the Second Vatican Council and so the parish was returned to the care of the diocesan clergy.

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





Author recounts parents' struggle with Hansen's disease, effect on family

BATON ROUGE, La. (CNS) -- Louisiana author Anne Harmon Brett wrote a 2019 book about her father's diagnosis of Hansen's disease, once called leprosy, and his life inside the National Leprosarium in Carville, Louisiana.

But her story also highlights her mother's diagnosis with the same disease and how she and her brother, raised by another couple, saw their parents in secret visits.

Her favorite childhood memories include "stolen moments" when her parents crawled through a hole under a fence at the National Leprosarium, where they were patients, to meet Anne and her brother, J.C., for Sunday picnics by the Mississippi River levee.

Brett's parents, Johnny and Anne Harmon, defied conventional boundaries and refused to let the disease rule their lives. The couple, patients at the now-closed Carville home along the Mississippi River, met there and fell in love but were not allowed to marry.

They secretly married outside the facility with the assistance and blessings of the Daughters of Charity, who took care of the patients physically and spiritually when most everyone else abandoned them.

Johnny Harmon, who refused to call himself a "leper," wrote about his journey from Texas to Carville, his romance with Anne and his determination to overcome adversities and live a

full life while living at Carville in his book: "King of the Microbes." Brett included her own reflections about this in: "The Disease: One Man's Journey Through a Life With Leprosy."

Five members of Brett's maternal side and two on her

paternal side were patients at Carville.

Brett was particularly touched by her father's

heartbreaking story concerning her mother's arrival at Carville and how hysteria about leprosy impacted her family.

In 1932, Brett's maternal grandmother, Louise Triche, who lived on a sugar plantation in Vacherie with her husband, Jack, and children, went to a local health clinic for a checkup and was diagnosed with the disease. She was immediately taken to Carville.

Two years later, Brett's mother and uncle also were sent to the same facility.

Before Brett's father's arrival Carville, he watched the effects of Hansen's on his brother Elmo, diagnosed with the disease in 1925 at age 16. In 1934, Elmo took a train to the Carville leprosarium, where the disease ravaged him before he died.


Johnny Harmon, who had worked for the Texas Highway Department and was working toward a college degree in engineering, thought about Elmo daily, and he and his dad visited Elmo as often as possible.

When Johnny Harmon was diagnosed with the disease in 1935 at 24, it made the front page of the Beaumont newspaper because of his position with the highway department. Harmon went to the leprosarium determined to make the most of his life there. He had his own photography lab and was a cartoonist, a painter and taught in the one-room schoolhouse at the facility which he dubbed "the first integrated school in Louisiana."

The Carville community had a movie theater, ballroom, cafeteria, tennis courts and two golf courses -- one for employees and one for patients -- who came from around the world.

Celebrations also were common, and it was at a 1936 Mardi Gras Ball that Johnny, then 24, met Anne, who "captured his heart."

In 1938, Johnny was cleared of Hansen's disease symptoms and released. Johnny attempted to resume his life in Texas, but the stigma followed him, thwarting career plans and causing him to fail his draft notice exam for World War II.

The Hansen's symptoms returned, and Johnny returned to Carville. Eventually, Anne and Johnny rekindled their romance and after receiving a pass, were

married at St. Roch's Catholic Church in New Orleans.

Patients at Carville were discouraged from having children. After Brett and her brother were born, they were placed with the Becnel family in Vacherie, who spoke only Cajun French. The Becnels brought the children to the secret picnic gatherings with their parents.

Johnny Harmon eventually symptom free of Hansen's but insisted on remaining at the Carville hospital because his wife was a patient there. Eventually he was "expelled" by doctors, but he remained nearby to be near his wife. When she was eventually released, the two made their home in Vacherie, where Johnny had a thriving photography business and the couple became members of Our Lady of Peace Parish

Brett said she has fond memories of visiting Carville

and noted the international community that was formed there. She said while she saw people in various stages of the diseases, but she never focused on their outward appearance because they had a "beauty within."

The presence of the religious sisters also kept a vibrant faith alive.

Her dad wrote about his own faith saying: "God gives us all a cross to bear. Some are bigger than others, but we all experience some sorrow in our life."

And of his diagnosis with Hansen's he said: "I never felt like a leper, not in the biblical sense of the word."




