The start of summer offers us a fresh opportunity to reevaluate how we are spending our time, energy, and hearts, and is an invitation to greater awareness of our purpose and mission in the coming season. I don't want to waste this time. Here are a few things I'm trying over the next several weeks to refresh my heart and soul.

If you are in need of a refresh this summer:

Get back to basics. Sometimes I can get so bogged

down in the details of daily living and decision-making that I forget the simple beauty of my vocation and calling. Because it really is simple. And, when my vocation or calling is feeling a little off, it's usually because I have overcomplicated things, have allowed myself to be distracted, or have neglected the hearts of those who are entrusted to me. So, I'm gettting back to basics: I am revisiting music and habits that inspire me, writing down simple goals for my vocation (and getting them done!), and cultivating habits that I have let slip in the busy-ness of this season.

Reprioritize (and rework) prayer. We all know that when life gets busy, prayer is usually the first thing to fall off the list. So this month, I am rededicating my usual prayer time and reinstating it as my non-negotiable. I'm encouraging myself to make prayer time more about building my relationship with God, and less about checking that prayer box in my daily planner.

Find a mentor. I have so, so much to learn - in every area of life. I need (and crave) the wisdom of women who have walked a little ahead of me. So. over the next couple of months, I'm reaching out to a few women in my church community. I want to buy them coffee. Seek their hard-earned wisdom. And, ask for their specific prayers while we're together.

Rest more than you think you should. Finally, I am doing my best to rest more than I think I should. I am making a concerted effort to claim more slow mornings, and to "waste" more time in our yard with the kids. How can you find spaces for extra leisure?

Brothers and sisters, if you feel a bit out of sync and in need of a refresh, don't fret. This is a normal cycle of life. The important thing is that we recognize it and do something about it. If you're in need of revitalization, start by telling Jesus about it, and ask Him where you should begin.

# Pope and grand ayatollah / Is feeding tube necessary?


Q. When the Holy Father and Avatollah al-Sistani met recently. at the end they stood facing each other and seemed to be talking without an interpreter. What language did they use in order to communicate? (Powhatan, Virginia)

A. According to the website of the Jesuit magazine America there was, in fact, an interpreter present. America said in its report on the March 6 meeting that "the two leaders of Christianity and Shia Islam sat beside a small wooden table and spoke with the assistance of the pope's Palestinian-born translator.'

**Q.** My 83-year-old sister has had dementia for many years. Now she is not eating regularly and seems to have no appetite. I was told that this is a sign that the end of life is nearing. As we are both Catholics, am I obligated to have her on life support and to begin tube feeding? I don't believe she would want this, and neither do I. (Long Island, New York)

**A.** Whether a feeding tube is required depends on the patient's circumstances. The Catechism of the Catholic Church reflects that teaching: "Discontinuing medical procedures that are burdensome. dangerous, extraordinary or disproportionate to the expected outcome can be legitimate" (No.

The general principle, as enunciated by St. John Paul II in a 2004 talk to the International Federation of Catholic Medical Associations and the Pontifical Academy for Life, is that artificial nutrition and hydration are, in principle, ordinary and proportionate measures and should be given to patients, even those who are in a persistent vegetative

And so nutrition and hydration should be provided to a terminally ill patient whose death does not appear to be imminent.

The church's point is that patients should die because of the underlying pathology and not because they are starved to death.

But that principle can overridden in particular situations; tube feeding would not be morally obligatory when it brings discomfort and pain to a person who is imminently dying or when the patient's body cannot assimilate it.

In your own situation, my view -- from a distance -- is that. if your sister is close to death, you are not under any obligation to begin tube feeding.

An additional consideration, in your case, is that patients with dementia sometimes pull tubes out and might need to be restrained in order to be fed.

# Syriac Catholic patriach says situation in Syria 'humanly unbearable'

BEIRUT (CNS) -- The Syriac Catholic patriarch said the situation in Syria "continues to be humanly unbearable and devastating" and risks emptying the war-torn country of its Christian community for good.

Patriarch Ignace Joseph III Younan called on Western countries to lift "all economic sanctions against Syria, because they only harm the innocent."

"The economic sanctions imposed on Syrian people by the Western governments in the name of democracy and political liberty have created horrendous consequences in a country that endured wars, siege and abandonment for over 10 years," Patriarch Younan told Catholic News Service May 23 after visiting Syria.

"Ordinary people are suffering poverty that borders on starvation," Patriarch Younan said. He cited the lack of medicine, food, and fuel for electricity and transportation.

The patriarch, who is based in Beirut, spent 10 days visiting three Syriac Catholic dioceses: Homs, in central Syria; Aleppo in the north; and Damascus, the capital.

"Despite the joy of the encounters and visits, one could not ignore the feelings of sadness and resentment in the heart of many," Patriarch Younan said.

"I could read the signs of anxiety on the faces of parents fearing to lose their youth who are facing despair, despite the assistance of churches and Christian organizations," he said.

"Objective interventions are necessary for reconciliation between Syrian citizens inside and outside the country. Effective U.N. mediation would focus on the safe return of the millions of people who have fled to neighboring countries," he said.

"It is time for all people of goodwill, especially Catholics in Western nations, to

understand that the situation in Syria continues to be humanly unbearable and devastating."

The Syrian-born patriarch, who led the Diocese of Our Lady of Deliverance for Syriac Catholics in the United States and Canada from 1986 to 2009, told CNS: "It is clear that the Western governments have had a wrong reading of the Syrian situation, its religious, confessional and ethnic diversity. They hastened to support the violent uprising, mostly for geopolitical reasons, imagining a democracy that is undoubtedly unfit for the Middle East region, that ignores the separation of church and state, religion and politics."

"Where there is no religious liberty, all other liberties

disappear," he said.

"Christians, both in Syria and Iraq, have already experienced the harmful and even deadly consequences of the chaos created by the agglomerated media, the political pressures and the military intervention by Western countries," Patriarch Younan said.

He added that Christians in Syria were "extremely grateful" to international Catholic organizations such as Aid to the Church in Need, the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, L'Oeuvre d'Orient and other Catholic communities and individuals for their "outpouring of support and Christian solidarity, so crucial for the survival of their brothers and sisters of faith for

the past 10 years."

In Aleppo, Patriarch Younan chaired the May 18-20 annual meeting of the Council of Heads of Catholic Churches in Syria with Melkite Catholic Patriarch Joseph Absi. Cardinal Mario Zenari, the Vatican nuncio to Syria, attended.

In his opening remarks, Cardinal Zenari noted that the economic sanctions implemented against Syria, including those implemented by the U.S., affect the most vulnerable Syrian citizens "in the heart of their daily life," so much so that "the garbage containers in the streets have become a source of food for the poorest."

Likewise, the participants addressed "the unjust sanctions

imposed on Syria" and demanded that they be lifted, according to the final statement of the meeting.

The prelates commended Caritas Syria, noting that its humanitarian and social efforts have covered all Syrian regions and all societal groups, without discrimination. This makes "the church present and effective, and its witness visible among the needy and suffering people whose number increases from day to day."

In Aleppo, the patriarch celebrated Masses, blessed married couples, ordained two seminarians for minor orders, and presided over devotional rites for the Marian Month of May. He also inspected the restoration works of two very damaged sites: St. Elijah's home for the elderly and a cemetery.

In Homs, Patriarch Younan presided over devotional prayers for the month of May with a community that filled the restored Holy Spirit Cathedral. He reminded people that Syria "is one of the first countries that knew Christianity and knew Jesus."

Patriarch Younan assured the faithful: "No matter what happens to us, and the acts of violence, destruction, chaos and suffering that lasted more than 10 years ... we will remain the people of God and followers of Lord Jesus."

The patriarch also visited the Syriac Catholic Monastery of Moses the Abyssinian, also known as Mar Musa, which dates back to the sixth century and was reopened and revitalized by Italian Jesuit Father Paolo Dall'Oglio, who disappeared July 2013 in Raqqa. There the patriarch met the monastic community of four friars and four nuns.

# The saving gift of fatherhood

I expected fatherhood to change the routines of my life. Everyone told me it would. Goodbye, sleep. Hello, collapsing in exhaustion at 8:00 p.m.

What I did not suppose was the way fatherhood would be an occasion for conversion.

Not that I was some sort of irreligious knave. I taught theology at the University of Notre Dame. I attended daily Mass as often as possible. I spent years as a catechist for middle school students.

The source of my unrighteousness was the absence of a disposition of solidarity. In every dimension of my life, I thought only of myself. At work, I focused on the trajectory of my career and where I was going in the future.

There were ladders to climb, and I wanted to be on them. It did not matter if climbing that ladder meant stepping on the heads of my colleagues. An unkind word here or there to the right person, and I would be elevated in the eyes of my superior.

When students were struggling in class, I thought only about the misery they wrought on me. You did not turn in your assignment on time! You thought that was a paper acceptable to write!

On not a few occasions, I failed students in class with a hidden albeit perverse joy. I pompously shared the worst things my students wrote, delighting that I could shine light on what I believed to be their idiocy.

And then my son was born.

Like all conversions in life, change was not immediate. Spending every night with a little babe who was struggling to keep his milk down was a vigorous initiation into a saving solidarity. As I attended to the suffering of this little creature, my beloved son, I began to think not of myself.

If sin, as St. Augustine notes, may be described as a curving in upon the self, God was inviting me, through my son, to attend to the rest of the human family around me rather than gazing inward at my own self.

In the years that followed, this disposition carried over into the rest of my life. I came to recognize that untrammeled ambition was not becoming of a father. I needed to be at the center of every project and initiative because, in my deformed imagination, I was the most important person in the room.

And yet, through the mundane care of my son, I came to see how wrong I was. My flourishing was tied to my colleagues' flourishing.

A similar conversion took place among my students. I could no longer separate my identity as dad from my identity as teacher. When students sent late-night emails begging for an extension because of exhaustion, I did not just grant them. I asked what was going on and whether they needed to meet.

I noticed how many of my students were distracted and suffering from problems at home. Their brother just went missing. Their dad was dying from cancer. I changed everything about my style of teaching and grading, putting these young men and women at the center. I rejoiced more at success than failure.

I suppose, in essence, this invitation to move outside of the self to the other is the divine pedagogy of fatherhood. Men, for the most part, do not grow up thinking about being dads. When I ask my undergraduate men if they have thought about being dads, few say yes.

And yet, for many of us, our sanctification will take place through fatherhood. St. Joseph is our icon. Unlike me, Joseph was already righteous. From the

beginning, it was clear that he thought about others.

He refused to make a stink when he learned that his betrothed was with child not by him. He listened to the angel. He cared for his little family as they trekked to Egypt and back. He worked in silence, living a mundane life in the presence of Jesus and Mary. He died in their arms.

In declaring a Year of St. Joseph during the COVID-19 pandemic, Pope Francis is prophetic. Think about the many social ills we are experiencing as a society, ills exacerbated by the pandemic: politicians who think more about their own career and self-importance than their responsibility for solidarity, businesses that operate with concern about profit margin alone, forgetting to care for their workers.

Arguments over masks and vaccines encourage us to forget that we human beings are made to care for others, that we are not the center of the cosmos. The saving gift of fatherhood for me was that I learned that I was not the center of the world.

And perhaps, in this Year of St. Joseph, through his intercession, church and society alike can rediscover the saving gift of fatherhood: being for others.



# Every prayer -- including yours -- is needed to increase vocations

Several weeks ago, April 25, the Vatican and many dioceses around the world celebrated the World Day of Prayer for Vocations.

In a letter to priests and parish life coordinators, vocations director for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, Father Michael Keucher wrote, "The church in the whole world will be storming heaven for God to bless his church with numerous holy vocations!"

And echoing the words of the late Franciscan Sister Norma Rocklage, a longtime educator at Marian University in Indianapolis, he added: "Every prayer counts."

We've editorialized about praying for religious vocations in the past, and we believe those petitions should be offered daily, asking for more holy men and women to minister in our church.

In this time of pandemic, the ministry they offer cannot be underestimated or unappreciated. We need to offer them thanks for their unwavering commitment to being the hands and feet of Christ to so many.

We understand the challenges priests and religious currently face, spreading the word of God and being present to those desperately seeking assistance.

They serve parishioners, the hungry and homeless and others through countless ministries. But for the past year, COVID-19 has had them ministering to an ever-growing population -- those impacted by the coronavirus -- some of them living in nursing homes and assisted living facilities, others who are patients in hospitals, still others staying at home because they feel safest without having to step outside their comfort zones.

Pope Francis reminds us vocations to ordained ministry and religious life are all about the gift of being present and giving to others.

"The Lord desires to shape the hearts of fathers and mothers: hearts that are open, capable of great initiatives, generous in self-giving, compassionate in comforting anxieties and steadfast in strengthening hopes," the pope wrote in his World Day of Prayer for Vocations message released at

the Vatican on March 19.

"The priesthood and the consecrated life greatly need these qualities nowadays, in times marked by fragility, but also by the sufferings due to the pandemic, which has spawned uncertainties and fears about the future and the very meaning of life," he wrote.

The Holy Father said religious and priestly life must be filled with the simple joy of caring every day for what really matters -- faithful friendship with God and one another.

"I pray that you will experience this same joy, dear brothers and sisters who have generously made God the dream of your lives, serving him in your brothers and sisters through a fidelity that is a powerful testimony in an age of ephemeral choices and emotions that bring no lasting joy," Pope Francis wrote.

Released on the feast of St. Joseph, the message was dedicated to the saint and "the dream of vocation." The pope declared a special year devoted to the saint starting Dec. 8, 2020, to encourage a greater love for and inspiration from Jesus' guardian and patron of the universal church

As the protector of Jesus and

the church, St. Joseph can be a model for all vocations, which are meant to be the "ever-active hands of the Father, outstretched to his children," the pope wrote.

St. Joseph has "the heart of a father, able to give and generate life in the midst of daily routines," which is the same aim of vocations, he wrote.

Jesus' earthly father, the pope said, is one of those gentle "saints next door" whose "strong witness can guide us on the journey."

The saint's heart was always listening to God, who spoke to him in his dreams, the Holy Father added.

"This applies also to our

calling: God does not like to reveal himself in a spectacular way, pressuring our freedom," Pope Francis wrote. "He conveys his plans to us with gentleness," speaking through one's thoughts and feelings and unveiling "profound and unexpected horizons."

Like St. Joseph, we each must find the courage to understand and follow God's will. In our vocations, the pope continued, "there can be no faith without risk."

In this Year of St. Joseph, let us each make a concerted effort to pray for more vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life.

There are resources on the archdiocese's vocations website at heargodscall.com, including videos, prayer resources, links and other helpful information.

As Father Keucher wrote: "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into the harvest" (Mt 9:37-38).

May our faith lead us to plant seeds for religious vocations. And through our efforts, we pray that more people will risk truly hearing -- and following -- God's call to the priesthood and religious life.

# Religious Freedom Week, June 22-29, 2021: Solidarity in Freedom

Religious Freedom Week takes place June 22 – 29 each year. It begins with the feast day of Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, includes the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, and ends with the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul.

The theme for this year is *Solidarity in Freedom*. The Church's promotion of religious freedom expresses her solidarity with all people who seek the good and who hope for fulfillment in the truth, which the Church teaches is ultimately found in Jesus Christ.

"Solidarity means much more than engaging in sporadic acts of generosity. It means thinking and acting in terms of community" (Fratelli tutti, 116). Religious freedom allows the Church, and all religious communities, to live out their faith in public and to serve the good of all.

The USCCB provides "Pray - Reflect - Act" resources at www.usccb.org/ReligiousFreedomWeek—one for each day on different



religious liberty topics. These materials help people learn about religious liberty from a Catholic perspective, pray about particular issues, and act on what they learn by advocating for policies that promote religious freedom.

The Pray-Reflect-Act resources show the breadth of religious liberty issues of concern for the bishops. The Committee for Religious Liberty has collaborated with the Office of International Justice and Peace to raise awareness about the persecution of Christians in Nicaragua and to lift up Pope

Francis's trip to Iraq this year. We need to be in solidarity with people throughout the world who suffer for their faith.

Domestically, a major area of concern continues to be freedom for Catholic institutions, such as schools, hospitals, and child welfare service providers, to carry out their missions with integrity.

While the United States has suffered the effects of the COVID pandemic, Catholics have stepped in to serve. Catholic schools,

like those in the Archdiocese of Boston, have led in showing how to safely reopen schools. In Hawaii, Catholic Charities has worked to help renters get access to government relief programs. In addition to its regular work of advocacy, Catholic Charities U.S.A. has provided personal protective equipment, organized food donations, and started the Francis Fund for Eviction Protection. However, religious organizations' ability to partner with the government in its relief efforts and to receive needed government aid is continually threatened by legislative provisions that would exclude some faiths but not others.

Another issue of special concern is the wave of attacks on Catholic churches that began in May of 2020. Vandals entered churches and desecrated sanctuaries. A man in Florida even attempted to set a church on fire with people inside. There have been over 60 attacks so

far, and that number continues to grow. The precise reasons for these attacks are often unknown. In some cases, they are tied to anger at perceived injustices from the past. Other cases may involve mental illness. In all cases, Catholics must remember that we worship the Lord who reveals the truth and beauty of the gospel in his suffering and resurrection, and that we are called to respond to aggression with compassion.

Through prayer, education, and public action during Religious Freedom Week, we can promote the essential right of religious freedom for Catholics and for those of all faiths.

## Parish Spotlight: Our Lady of Sorrows Church Moreauville, Louisiana Established 1944

Msgr. Stanley DeKeuwer was responsible for securing land for a new church in Moreauville to serve the black Catholics in the community. A new church was built and Bishop Greco formally established it as the center of an independent parish in 1946. The Holy Ghost Fathers were invited to take charge of the new parish. They served until the 1970's when a priest of the Holy Cross congregation, Fr. George Dolan, took over for a short time. A school was opened in 1949 and it remained in operation until 1970.

In recent years, the parish has served an active congregation of over 100 families.

Today, Father Jose Pallipurath, pastor at Sacred Heart Church in Moreauville, is also the pastor of Our Lady of Sorrows



# Helping our daughters reclaim the true meaning of their bodies

Many parents, and I was one of them, dread having to have "the talk" as their child approaches puberty. We are not quite sure what to say about teen fertility awareness, and we fear what questions we may get.

Looking back, I see that practicing fertility awareness helped my husband and me grow comfortable talking about intimate issues ourselves. This helped us down the road when we began talking to our children about their bodies.

For instance, we always used accurate terminology when talking to them about their body parts. We didn't realize this was laying the groundwork for being able to talk to them more easily about intimate things as they got older.

It also provided a few of our funniest memories (ugh!):

- Our neighbors told us that our 5-year-old happily announced to them that we were going to Vagina Beach for vacation.
- Spotting a cover of Cosmopolitan magazine at the grocery checkout, our daughter loudly exclaimed, "Wow, mom, I bet Kevin wishes you had those breasts!" (Kevin was the new nursing baby brother, but no one else in earshot knew that!)

Being open with them also brought some tender moments that gently pointed them toward God's plan for openness to life. I was asked more than once if I was sick when they saw me taking my




