Religious Freedom Week 2022: June 22-29

Religious Freedom Week takes place June 22-29 each year. It begins with the feast day of Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, includes the Nativity of St. John the Baptist, and ends with the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul.

The Church plays a crucial role in both bearing witness to the gospel of life and serving all of those people who will be affected by these discussions and their outcomes.

The USCCB provides "Pray-Reflect-Act" resources at www.usccb.org/ReligiousFreedomWeek, one for each day on different religious liberty topics. These materials help teach about religious liberty from a Catholic perspective, pray about particular issues, and act on what they learn by advocating for policies that promote religious freedom.

The theme for this year is Life and Dignity for All. Among some of this year's issues, as we approach the Supreme Court decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, we are especially mindful of the debates around our country about abortion. The Church plays a crucial role in both bearing witness



to the gospel of life and serving all of those people who will be affected by these discussions and their outcomes.

The Committee for Religious Liberty has collaborated with the Office of International Justice and Peace to raise awareness about the religious liberty in China. We need to be in solidarity with people throughout the world who suffer for their faith.

Domestically, a major area of concern continues to be freedom for Catholic institutions, such as schools, hospitals, and child welfare service providers, to carry out their missions with integrity. In particular, protecting Catholic adoption and foster care will become even more vital, as we take new steps in building a

culture of life and dignity for all in the United States.

To build a culture of life and dignity for all, the Church must support women and children. In 2020, the USCCB Committee on Pro-Life Activities launched Walking with Moms in Need. This initiative seeks to help parishes become places where pregnant and parenting women can find support and accompaniment. We encourage Catholics to learn about how their parishes can connect with local institutions and accompany women and children at www.walkingwithmoms.com.

Pregnancy resource centers provide counseling and support for moms who want to choose life. In some places, though, abortion activists have sought to curtail the activities of these centers, working to force them to advertise abortion. In 2018, pregnancy resource centers in California successfully defended their work at the U.S. Supreme Court. But in places like Connecticut, for example, abortion activists show no signs of stopping their campaign against pregnancy resource centers. These centers support life and dignity for all.

Beginning in July 2021, the Committee for Religious Liberty began publishing articles on basic issues in religious liberty. This resource helps Catholics learn more about Church teaching and fundamental questions related to religious freedom. The essays are available at www.usccb.org/FirstFreedomBlog.

Buffalo bishop lays flowers, personal prayer at mass shooting memorial

BUFFALO, N.Y. (CNS)
-- Bishop Michael W. Fisher of
Buffalo joined mourners outside
a Tops grocery store where 10
people were killed and three
others were injured in what law
enforcement authorities said was
a racially motivated crime.

Placing flowers and a handwritten note remembering "the souls of our brothers and sisters lost to the acts of violence and racism" at a growing memorial outside the store, Bishop Fisher paid his respects to the victims May 17, the Western New York Catholic reported.

Cheryl Calire, director of pastoral ministries for the Buffalo



Diocese, told the Buffalo diocesan news outlet that the bishop's visit was a way to offer a "prayerful, peaceful way of being present" with others who had gathered at the site.

Bishop Fisher talked with police and fire department officials who were coordinating the investigation at the crime scene as investigators combed the store and surrounding area for evidence that could be linked to the suspect in the mass killing, 18-year-old Payton S. Gendron of Conklin, New York.

All of those who died were Black as was one of the three who were injured.

Police said Gendron, who is white, allegedly was wearing tactical gear and armed with an assault weapon when he entered the supermarket around 2:30 p.m. May 14 and began shooting people he encountered. He has been charged with first-degree murder and remained in custody without bail.

Gendron has entered a plea of "not guilty." He is scheduled for another court appearance May 19.

Authorities said they discovered a chilling 180-page manifesto that was posted online in which Gendron allegedly stated he wanted to "kill as many Blacks as possible" and claimed some groups are trying to replace white people in the U.S. with people of color

Accompanied by Calire,

Bishop Fisher visited the scene after President Joe Biden and first lady Jill Biden left the area. The Bidens also laid a bouquet of flowers at the makeshift memorial and grieved with family members of the victims.

In a speech during his visit, the president vowed that "white supremacy will not have the last word."

Also at the memorial site were Father Paul Seil, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Buffalo and a chaplain for the Buffalo Fire Department, and Felician Sister M. Johnice Rzadkiewicz, executive director of the Response to Love Center on the city's east side.

Father Seil met with two deputy fire commissioners, the Western New York Catholic reported. Police officers led Bishop Fisher and Father Seil through part of the crime scene as well

Bishop Fisher also briefly met with other religious leaders who were at the scene.

"It was a good pastoral visit," Calire said. "People were coming up to him and asking him to pray for them. It was so nice to see a shepherd in his element. That's what he has been called to do. And he was on the street with the people bringing comfort just by his presence."

Shortly after the shooting, Bishop Fisher condemned on Twitter "the scourge of senseless gun violence that has taken the lives of so many across our nation

and changed the lives of countless innocent men, women and children must come to an end."

On May 17, he later updated his remarks saying that innocent people were victimized in the killing spree. "No love was shown in this rampage, only the deepest of hate," he said.

"This country has struggled for years with the practice of racism and white supremacy that has victimized communities of color and has weakened us all. My hear is so heavy, and I pray for the victims, their families, friends and this community traumatized by this tragedy," he said in a statement.

"Faith," he continued, "compels us to reject the abject evil of racism and white supremacy, and to say 'no' to terror, and 'no' to the intent to silence Black and Brown voices."

The bishop will host an interfaith prayer service May 23 at St. Martin de Porres Church, located near the grocery store.

Religious communities and individuals participated in an online prayer service May 17 organized by #Onebody, a diverse ministry that addresses racial and social justice.




Forgetting eucharistic fast / Site of the Ascension

Q: Recently I graduated from high school, and I have a question about the eucharistic fast. This morning I went to the 7:30 Mass and had a cup of coffee with a protein shake in it before I left for church. The church was only a few minutes away, and I received Communion at the Mass, not thinking anything about the fast.

Is this a mortal sin? It was a complete mistake, but I feel so horrible for accidentally disrespecting the Eucharist, and I would greatly appreciate your guidance (city and state withheld).

A. Of course it's not a mortal sin -- or any sin at all. It was simply -- as you said -- a mistake, done without any thought at all. Sin requires a deliberate intention to do something wrong. And here is my question for you: What do you think God is really like?

For me, God is not some giant scorekeeper in the sky whose primary interest it is to keep track of rights and wrongs. God is the person who brought you into existence out of love, wants you to be happy here on earth and to be with him forever in heaven. So try to relax and know how much god loves you.



Question Corner

Q. Where did the Ascension take place? Matthew and Mark tell us that the apostles are to go back to Galilee, but Luke says that they should stay in Jerusalem until Jesus has risen. (Louisville, Kentucky)

A. On top of the Mount of Olives outside of Jerusalem's Old City is a small hexagonal chapel that commemorates the site of the ascension of Jesus.

St. Luke narrates in the Acts of the Apostles how the disciples gathered with Jesus and "as they were looking on, he was lifted up and a cloud took him out of their sight." Then, Luke notes, "they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath's journey away" (Acts 1:9-12).

In the weeks following his rising from the dead, Jesus appeared to the apostles and disciples on a number of occasions, both in Jerusalem and in Galilee.

On Easter itself, he appeared to Mary Magdalene, to the women at the tomb, to Peter, to the two disciples on the road to Emmaus and to the 10 apostles in Jerusalem (when Thomas was not present).

A week later, when Thomas was with them, he appeared again to the apostles in Jerusalem. Later,

he appeared to seven disciples as they were fishing near the shore of the Sea of Tiberias (John 21:1) and to 11 disciples on a mountain in Galilee (Matthew 28:!6).

The ascension marks the final departure of Jesus for heaven following this series of apparitions. From then on, the disciples were to live by faith and communicate with Jesus through prayer and the sacraments.

As the Catechism of the Catholic Church (No. 659) explains the sequence, "Christ's body was glorified at the moment of his resurrection, as proved by the new and supernatural properties it subsequently and permanently enjoys.

"But during the 40 days when

he eats and drinks familiarily with his disciples and teaches them abou the kingdom, his glory remains veiled under the appearance of ordinary humanity.

"Jesus' final apparition ends with the irreversible entry of his humanity into divine glory, symbolized by the cloud and by heaven, where he is seated from that time forward at God's right hand."

Monsignor Ronald C. Hoppe passes away

Monsignor Ronald Cyril Hoppe, a priest of the Diocese of Alexandria, passed from this life on April 4, 2022 at the age of 92. Born in New Orleans September 13, 1930 to William Francis Hoppe and Elizabeth McInerney, he attended St. Mary of the Angels Parochial School and Holy Cross High School before continuing his studies at Loyola University. He was received as a seminarian for the Diocese of Alexandria by Bishop Greco in 1948 and went on to study at St. Joseph Seminary College, Maryhill Seminary and Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans. He was ordained a priest on June 7, 1958.

During his more than fifty years of ministry. Msgr. Hoppe served as a parochial vicar at Mater Dolorosa Church in Plaucheville, St. Mary's Assumption Church in Cottonport and as an instructor at Maryhill Seminary. He served as pastor of St. John the Baptist Church in Deville, St. Jude's Church in Bossier City and at St.

Frances Cabrini Church in Alexandria. He also served as pastor of St. Louis Church in Glenmora and its missions in Elmer and Seiper.

addition In to parochial duties, Hoppe served the diocese in various roles as Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia, as a member of the College of Consultors, the Diocesan Finance Council and the Presbyteral Council. served as the Episcopal Vicar for Retreats and Spirituality and as Vicar for Religious. He

also served as the Diocesan Administrator before the appointment of Bishop Jacobs in 1989. In recognition of his service to the Church, Fr. Hoppe was named a Prelate of Honor with the title Reverend Monsignor by Pope St. John Paul II in 1988. He retired from active ministry in 2009.

Msgr. Hoppe was invested as a Knight of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem and was a faithful member and supporter of the Knights of Columbus. A born storyteller with an infectious smile, Msgr. Hoppe never lost his love for his native New Orleans and its culture. He shared his faith and spirituality through missions his and retreats across the country and through a regular column in the Alexandria Daily Town Talk. A fantastic chef, Msgr. Hoppe loved to nourish the body as well as the soul.

He is survived by his cousins: Sr. Rosemary Hoppe, Dominican Sisters of Peace, Janell Blei, Louis Morgan, Joy Morgan and Alton Morgan Sr.

The conference founders are: Colette Glankler, Jerri Grafton, Nicole Mitchell, Charlotte Wasmer and Deacon Richard Mitchell.



The Diocese of Alexandria office of religious education and faith formation is the means by which the Bishop, as head of the community and teacher of doctrine, directs and moderates all of the catechetical activities throughout the diocese.

Duties and responsibilities to include (but not limited to):

- To work with all diocesan and parish ministries to further the diocesan mission of religious education and evangelization, specifically working closely and collaboratively with Pastoral Leadership, Office of Divine Worship, and all other diocesan programs associated with the development of faith formation.
- To analyze the catechetical needs of the Diocese and develop policies and procedures to achieve these needs.
- To establish/Manage a Diocesan Certified Catechist program.
- To coordinate liturgical training/certification programs
- Develop and manage continuing education programs for adults of all ages.
- Prepare budget and engage in strategic planning for the office
- Other duties and responsibilities may be assigned to meet the needs of the diocese.
- To assist parishes/Directors of Religious Education (DREs) with guidelines, evaluation, resources, training, develop processes and budgets.

Requirements: A Master's Degree or equivalent in Religious Studies, Religious Education, Theology or a related field preferred. Other training or formation as a religious, permanent deacon or certified teacher along with experience as a catechetical leader on a parish, regional, or diocesan level may substitute for the Master's Degree requirement.

The diocesan director of religious and faith formation should be an exemplary Catholic with advanced academic training in theology, catechesis or a related field; proven experience in parish catechesis; excellent communication and leadership skills; and the ability to collaborate effectively. In addition, this person should have a working knowledge of computer programs and technology, especially as it relates to catechesis.

Adopt-a-Mom program: Being pro-life for mother and child

It is always disheartening when I hear people criticize the pro-life movement as simply being anti-abortion and that we throw out life once it is born. Obviously, this is not true and I always look for ways to show that we support women and children. It is sometimes hard to show a concrete example.

That changed in the spring of 2021. I came across a pro-life organization called "Let Them Live" which not only provided outreach programs to mothers considering abortion for the purpose of changing their mind, but also provided finances, support, counseling, prenatal care, and everything the mother needs to overcome challenges.

Unfortunately, 73% of all abortions occur simply because the mother does not have the means to support a child. Many others have an abortion because of lack of support from family. "Let Them Live" is geared to change that. After I researched the organization, I began to be committed as a donor. I immediately began to receive phone calls and letters from actual moms who said that my donations helped them to keep their child! I felt driven to do more.

I reached out to "Let Them Live" and asked what I could do to help more in their mission. At the time, they were launching a pilot program called "Adopt-A-Mom" where a church would sponsor a mother who was considering abortion and the church would become their support community. Some people will ask, "does the mother want to give the child up for adoption?" Sometimes that happens but "Let Them Live"

says the goal is to encourage and empower the mom to be a mother for her child. The church raises funds, writes letters, sends gifts and in return the church receives ultrasounds, letters, updates and eventually a personal contact with the mother! I was excited about the program and overwhelmed to discover that St. Frances Cabrini Church in Alexandria (where I was assigned at the time), would be the first church in the U.S. to participate!

Our mom's name was "Yahaira" and starting in March of 2021, we created a display board in the church, had fundraisers, collected letters and prayed for her. As the program grew, we got beautiful little ultrasounds, a handwritten letter, an update on the gender and name (his name

was 'Anders') and eventually I was able to Facetime with Yahaira. I was so moved when she broke down and cried and said keeping her child was the best decision she ever made and that she couldn't have done it without our support. Just our encouragement got her through it.

In April of this year, "Let Them Live" reached out to me again to see if my new parish in St. Joseph, LA would be interested in adopting a mom. We unanimously agreed and our parish is currently assisting another mom. We have been raising money, writing her cards and letters, and planning days of prayer for her. Our entire parish is excited and is very involved in the process.

I invite anyone who wants to promote pro-life to engage in

Diaconate Ordination set for June 4

The Diocese of Alexandria is pleased to announce that thirteen men will be ordained to the permanent diaconate at St. Francis Xavier Cathedral on June 4. Because of the large group that will be ordained at one time, and due to limited seating in the Cathedral, we regret that the ordination will not be open for public attendance and is limited to the deacon candidates' families only.

In the Catholic Church, the diaconate is the first of three ranks in ordained ministry. Deacons preparing for the priesthood are transitional deacons. Those not

planning to be ordained priests are permanent deacons and may or may not be married.

Deacons are ordained as a sacramental sign to the Church and to the world of Christ, who came "to serve and not to be served."

The entire Church is called by Christ to serve, and the deacon, in virtue of his sacramental ordination and through his various ministries, is to be a servant in a servant-Church.

Parish Spotlight: St. Genevieve Church, Brouillette established 1953

In 1907, Mr. A. Brouillette donated a section of his land so that a chapel could be built in the area along Red River north of Marksville. Plans for a new chapel were drawn up by Fr. Jean B. Limagne of St. Joseph's in Marksville and the structure was completed in 1908 and dedicated in honor of St. Genevieve, the patroness of Paris. Fr. Limagne's assistant, Fr. Hippolitus Benezit, baptized five persons in the little chapel on March 1, 1908. The community would become known as Brouillette.

In 1910, there were 100 families who worshipped regularly at St. Genevieve's. By 1914 the number had increased to 520 communicants. The small chapel was struck by lightning and burned in 1915 but it was rebuilt by Fr. Nicholas Judermanns by 1920.

The second church was destroyed by a tornado. It was rebuilt and dedicated by Bishop Daniel Desmond on October 20, 1940.



ST. GENEVIEVE CHURCH, BROUILLETTE.

In 1953, Bishop Charles Greco established St. Genevieve's as an independent parish. Fr. Marcel Anderson was named the first pastor of the new parish. Fr. Anderson built a rectory and a parish hall during his term as pastor.

Under Fr. Armando Fuoco, ground was broken for a new church in 1963. The new structure, built by James Eiland,

Jr. of Bunkie, was completed in December of 1963 and blessed by Bishop Greco on April 12, 1964.

Under Fr. Louis Voorhies a new hall was built in 1974 and a new rectory in 1975. Mr. James Eiland was the contractor on all these projects and contributed greatly to their completion.

Today, St. Genevieve still serves its small community along the Red River north of Marskville.





Pope tells grandparents to leave grandkids their legacy of wisdom

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Pope Francis told older people to use retirement as a time to serve others and to sow the seeds of their wisdom.

When people retire, starting the new chapter in life requires "a creative attention, a new attention, a generous availability," the pope said during his general audience in St. Peter's Square May 11.

"The previous skills of active life lose their constraint and become resources to be given away: teaching, advising, building, caring, listening ... preferably in favor of the most disadvantaged who cannot afford any learning or who are abandoned in their loneliness," he said.

Communities, he said, must



understand "how to benefit from the talents and charisms of so many elderly people who are already retired, but who are a wealth to be treasured."

The pope continued his series of talks dedicated to the meaning and value of "old age" and reflected

on the biblical figure of Judith, a pious widow, who, as a young woman, "had won the esteem of the community with her courage" in killing the commander-inchief of the threatening armies of Nebuchadnezzar.

With her heroism, she lived "to the fullest the mission the Lord had entrusted to her," the pope said, and then, as an older widow with no children, she saw "it was time for her to leave the good legacy of wisdom, tenderness

and gifts for her family and her community."

When people reach retirement age, they usually can expect to have many years ahead of them, he said. They may wonder what they should do and ask, "how can I grow in authority, in holiness, in wisdom?"

If there are grandchildren, there will be "the task, joyful and tiring" of looking after them, he said.

"The little ones learn the power of tenderness and respect for frailty" from their grandparents, and grandparents learn that "tenderness and frailty are not solely signs of decline: for young people, they are conditions that humanize the future," he said.

But sometimes family members live far apart, there are fewer children, and employment and housing conditions may be "unfavorable" to an intergenerational family, or families may not want grandparents to have an educational role or to do more than just help out when

needed, he added.

With so many new demands on today's families, he said, they must learn to "reshape the traditional connection between the generations" and make their "conditions more human, more loving, more just."

"When we think of a legacy," he said, "at times we think of goods, and not of the goodness that is done in old age, and that has been sown, that goodness that is the best legacy we can leave," not just goods or assets."

The pope encouraged people to read the Book of Judith to be inspired by her example. "Judith is not a pensioer who lives the emptiness it brings melancholically: she is a passionate mature woman who fills the time God gives her with gifts."

"This is how I would like all our grandmothers to be: courageous, wise and who bequeath to us not money, but the legacy of wisdom, sown in their grandchildren," he said.

Healthy habits: rebuilding relationships this year

When I was in graduate school, I took a class on faith and culture that included a segment on immigration. Instead of getting into the issue, we were first asked to share the stories of how our families came to this country. Then, we took the time to listen to how every single person in the room had personally been affected by the issue. It was one of the most powerful experiences of community and vulnerability that I have ever had, simply because we started with listening and sharing our stories

With the start of summer comes new opportunities to build or rebuild relationships with the staff we serve with, our parishioners, parents, and especially our teens. It will be tempting to sink back into old structures, habits, and modes of doing ministry "the way things were." However, the ways we minister going forward will require vulnerability, and we will need to continue to adapt to new needs, issues, and circumstances.

Things are different now

We have experienced a collective cultural shift encompassing a wide variety of issues and events: a global pandemic with extraordinary losses and suffering, political and religious division, a surge in activitism and deeper awareness of social justice issues, a radically fluctating economy, and a substantial increase in addiction, depression, anxiety, and suicide.



The odds are that everyone you come into contact with has been impacted somehow and is different because of it. Unfortunately, many of them may be holding on to unprocessed grief, loss, anxiety, or trauma. We have to act as though we are beginning at square one with everyone at our parish if we want to avoid running past the important things in the lives of those around us that the Lord is calling us to be present to.

You are called to service, not slavery

Before we can do any of that, we also need to acknowledge the ways we are different, the ways we have been hurt, and the ways we have felt taken advantage of, forgotten, or mistreated in ministry. There is a lot of rebuilding to do, but it is not all up to you, so set healthy boundaries. You are called to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39), which you cannot faithfully do if you

are not prioritizing caring for and loving yourself. Every time you say "no" to something, you are saying "yes" to something else. So, this is your permission to say "no" more this eyar so you can say "yes" to the things that are genuinely priorities. Say "no" to overcommitting, overworking, losing sleep, working 12-hour days, and not delegating thing that other people can easily do for you.

All that being said, here are a few suggestions on how to build and rebuild relationships at your parish this summer:

First and Foremost:

Root yourself in prayer and set aside time to be spiritually, mentally, physically, and emotionally recharged before you dive into ministry.

Treat every relationship as if it is brand new and invest time in relational ministry.

Intimacy requires vulnerability, and vulnerability is a two-way street. Be willing to initiate conversations and share

how you have changed and your struggles. Sharing personally can be incredibly powerful and break down barriers to build a deeper sense of trust.

Parish Staff:

Recognize that many of those you work with have been through similar experiences that you have.

Spend time in prayer and conversation together. If you do not already, suggest incorporating sharing Glory stories from ministry or personal lives and praying together at your staff meetings.

Pray specifically for the intercession of your parish namesake.

Avoid "silo-ing" by building bridges with other ministry leaders and staff members.

Collaborate to put on an intergenerational event or mission for the whole parish for Lent, Easter, or Advent instead of several separate ones. Planning together will allow more time to build stronger relationships and see how your gifts fit together to serve the parish community collectively.

Parishioners:

Be present. Instead of jumping back into planning a bunch of events, try attending different Masses and other ministries to meet parishioners you would not normally encounter. Pray with the Rosary group, play bingo or bridge with the game group, stick around after Mass to meet someone new without the intention of recruiting them or getting them to come to something.

Attend a parish event simply to enjoy it with those around you

without having to do anything and focus on reengaging with and meeting new parishioners.

Listen and ask questions to gauge where parishioners are at and what they need so that you can bring this valuable feedback back to the staff and your core team.

Parents and Teens:

Spend more time than anything else you do focusing on relational ministry.

Have open office hours where they can drop by to catch up or pray with you.

In every email, text, phone call, or personal interaction, ask how you can pray for them. If possible, pray for them on the spot.

Ask regularly for prayer requests on social media and at Life and Edge nights.

Create a designated place for written prayer requests in your youth room, office, or in your meeting space.

When appropriate, share prayer requests (without using names) with your core team, parish staff, or prayer team.

There is much rebuilding to do, but you are not called to rebuild a ministry that would serve people well two years ago. God has chosen you to specifically serve in your specific parish at this time in salvation history with those who are around you. He has put you all in each other's lives for a purpose, so be present to those you serve and serve with. Only then will the path forward become clearer, and you will likely find a wider group of support, friends, and coworkers in the vineyard trekking forward alongside you.
