'Heed their cries and help': U.S. bishop pleads for hungry as Russia attacks Ukraine's grain



(OSV News) — As Russia attacks Ukraine's grain exports — which feed millions in several nations — a U.S. bishop is calling on global leaders to ensure food security.

"Russia's recent decision no longer to allow Ukraine to export tons of grain means more people are likely to go hungry," said Bishop David J. Malloy of Rockford, Illinois, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on International Justice and Peace, in an Aug. 7 statement.

Last month, Russia walked away from the Black Sea Grain Initiative, which expired July 17. Brokered by the United Nations and Turkey in July 2022, the agreement enabled vitally needed food supplies from Ukraine to reach global markets amid Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, which was launched in February 2022 following aggression begun in 2014.

Global food prices soared as Russia blocked Ukraine's ports, preventing crucial agricultural

exports from the nation known as "Europe's breadbasket."

Under the Black Sea grain deal, close to 33 million tons of grain and agricultural products were exported from three Ukrainian Black Sea ports — Odesa, Chernomorsk and Yuzhny/ Pivdennyi — to 45 countries. More than half of the shipments were maize, with wheat, sunflower product and other agricultural goods comprising the balance. Sixtyfive percent of the wheat exported through the initiative reached developing countries.

As a result of the grain initiative, the World Food Program

transported more than 725,000 tons of wheat to vulnerable populations in Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, Sudan and Yemen. In both 2022 and the year prior, Ukraine supplied more than half of the program's wheat grain.

Since walking away from the Black Sea grain deal, Russia has relentlessly struck Ukraine's ports, including Odesa and Mykolaiv, as well as Izmail, located on the Danube River across from Romania. In addition, Russia announced it would regard all ships heading for Ukrainian waters to be military targets. (An Israeli cargo vessel became the first to defy the blockade on July 31, followed by other ships registered with Greece, Turkey and Georgia, according to at least one report.)

"Russia's decision to withdraw from the BSGI and its bombing of grain storage facilities in Ukraine will greatly impact the availability of food supplies at a time when more people are in dire need of food," said Bishop Malloy. "With the number of forcibly displaced people at a record high, the World Food Programme estimates 345 million people will face acute hunger this year, with 129,000 potentially facing famine in places like Afghanistan, Syria, Yemen, the Horn of Africa and Myanmar."

The bishop quoted a plea made by Pope Francis during a June 1, 2022, audience, during which the pope issued "a heartfelt appeal that every effort be made to resolve this issue and to guarantee the universal human right to food."

"Please do not use wheat, a staple food, as a weapon of war!" Pope Francis said at the time.

Noting that "the food crisis is intertwined with persistence of conflicts," Bishop Malloy said he joined with Pope Francis "in calling on global leaders to look beyond narrow national interests, focus on the common good, and join in ensuring that critical food supplies can flow to those most in need."


"The most vulnerable are crying in hunger," said Bishop Malloy. "With the compassion of Christ, we need to heed their cries and help."

Uniquely formed: Helping others through spiritual direction

Drew Brees was born to play football. Winston Churchill was born to lead. St. Teresa of Calcutta was born to serve the poor. I'm convinced I am called to do spiritual direction ministry.

I didn't always think that. In fact, for most of my life, I had no idea what I was called to do. But I've always known two things about myself: I'm an introvert and I enjoy helping others. Knowing these two things helped me recognize God's call to serve.

I'm sure there were times when I was growing up when my family worried about me. I come from a Cajun family, and Cajuns like to talk and socialize. Not me. I was the quiet one in the family, the observer, the listener,

the one who processed everything internally. I've always been more comfortable with a book and a quiet nook in which to read it. I've always been the person in the background, observing and listening instead of doing and talking. Even my hobbies are introverted: baking, gardening, birdwatching. Don't get me wrong, I have nothing against interacting with people, but it's definitely not my natural choice.

Which brings me to the second thing that makes me "me". I like helping people, and that goes back a long way. One of my earliest memories is volunteering to clean the blackboards and chalk erasers for my second grade teacher every day after school. (I realize many of you are too young to remember blackboards and erasers.) Being available to help others, no matter how small the task, is a way for me to express gratitude for God's generosity.

Fast forward to my present vocation, spiritual direction. As retirement from thirty years in state government approached, I wondered how I could use my introversion and desire to help others in this new phase.

In the months before retirement, I noticed my coworkers would stop by my office just to chat. They said they felt welcomed there. Some came to talk, some just came to sit and regroup mentally and emotionally. Many times I didn't have to say anything, I just had to be there and listen. It was becoming apparent to me that I enjoyed listening one-onone to people. It felt very natural and helpful. About this time, I made my annual retreat during which I shared my retirement concerns with my director. She suggested I consider the ministry of spiritual direction. I was caught off guard by her suggestion, but at the same time I was curious. When I attended an informational meeting and listened to the information being given, I felt an attraction, a longing almost, a peace and certainty about becoming a spiritual director. I registered for the training that very evening. It's been eight years since then and I have not regretted that decision

Looking back, I can see that God was forming me to be where I am today. My introversion, my listening skills, my desire to help others were all coming together at a time in my life when I had the time and the life experience to use them. God is doing the same in your life, that is, revealing your innate gifts, giving you life experiences, and putting mentors in your life. It's just a matter of being aware and being open to where God is leading you. May you each come to know and follow God's unique call in your life.

Go Deeper:

• It's never too early (or too

late!) to notice where God might be leading you. Think of Drew Brees on his high school football team. He surely was aware he had a natural ability to throw the ball; Winston Churchill must have known he could debate and make decisions; St. Teresa of Calcutta always lived a life of service. These were things they all noticed about themselves. God gave them their special unique abilities and provided them with people who could reveal and nurture what God had given them. So become aware of your gifts, talents, and natural leanings.

• Watch for God's hand leading you to use them. Everything in our lives can be used to serve God. Notice where God is each day. Even the not so great things in your day can be ways to learn and grow in grace. We are called to share what we have learned from God with others.

• Pray with Jeremiah 18, "The Potter". Imagine yourself in God's pottery workshop. Watch as God lovingly looks upon you and creates something out of the clay. See how pleased God is to create it. What does it look like? What kind of shape did it take? What does the shape mean to you? What do you say as God gifts you with it? Let this give you insight into how uniquely created and formed you are.

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Eight Spiritual Directors to assist in your prayer life

It was about 4 a.m. one morning in September 2017 when I heard my cellphone notification inform me of a new email. Since I was recently hired by the diocese and this was a new email address, I did not think the message would be "Junk Mail". I could not resist and decided to look to see who in the world would be sending me an email so early in the morning. To my surprise it was from our bishop (at the time) Bishop David Talley. The email simply said "Come to my office when you get in."

As my heart began racing and my mind running, I tried to think of what I had done wrong in the one month since being hired. Did I offend someone? Did I eat someone's leftovers in the refrigerator? I began recalling my conversations and actions for the last few weeks. Of course, I could not go back to sleep and had a few hours before arriving at the office.

As you can image, I arrived to work early that day and headed straight to the bishop's office. As I sat in front of him expecting the worst, he began speaking about the lack of certified spiritual directors in the diocese. He asked if I was available to travel to Shreveport to participate in an informational session for a program that was offered by the Archdiocese of New Orleans. "So I'm not in trouble?" I asked. With a puzzled look, he asked me: "Why would you be in trouble?"

It did not take too many more 4 a.m. emails for me to realize these were common with him and for my sanity I needed to silence my phone!

I share that story for two reasons. First to explain the origins of how our current spiritual direction program was adopted by the diocese. Secondly (and more importantly) is to prove a point that sometimes we need to have someone in our spiritual life that can help us discern and grow in our relationship with the Lord and help direct us away from our own insecurities and other static in our spiritual lives that is not of God.

The informational session went very well and I learned the program is a two-year internship with an intense study of the theology of the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola and practical experience in journeying with God's people. Those who graduate and become certified have met monthly, participated in peer group feedback sessions, have directed 8-day retreats under supervision and many other activities to ensure they are well qualified.

In August 2021 our first group of 4 graduated from the program. More recently, with the continued blessing of Bishop Marshall, another 4 graduated in August 2023 which brings us to 8 certified spiritual directors in the diocese.

Those eight are: Renee

Aldridge, Maria Burke, Ingrid Canella, Joan Dobard, Nicole Mitchell, Patrick Moore, Tracy Simpson, and Charlotte Wasmer.

Graduates are obviously committed to this ministry, and we are blessed to have them.

So you may be asking yourself "Would I benefit from having a Spiritual Director?" The short answer is "Yes!" We can all benefit from speaking with someone about our prayer life and ways to strengthen our relationship with our Lord. To challenge us in those times we seem to have it all together and to help guide us through those times when we feel separated from God.


About the book, Mr. Descant says:

"Writing this book fulfilled a personal goal of mine and has covered a span of forty years to completion. As you know, forty is a significant number in the Bible. There are over 150 times where the number forty is mentioned in the Bible, giving the number forty a great significance. For example: Moses and the Israelites wandered forty years in the desert; God destroyed the world in the great flood, lasting forty days and forty nights; Jesus wandered in the desert for forty days of prayer and fasting; and many more examples can be found.

The format of the book is arranged in order to tell the story of Jesus's life on earth through poetry. It begins with His birth and progresses on to the resurrection and descent of the Holy Spirit. This book can be read for enjoyment or used to extend your knowledge and reinforcement of our Christian beliefs. After each poem, study guides have been developed for individual or group study, depending on the needs of the reader. The study guide is designed to have the reader dig deeper into the content of the poetry and how it relates to our faith.

It has been a joy to write this book, and I hope it is helpful for anyone wanting to develop a relationship with the Lord or strengthening the relationship they already have."

Many are familiar with the names Marcus and Liz Descant. You may have seen Mr. Descant's large collection of religious relics



in-person which he displays from time to time at schools and church events as well as at the Steubenville South Youth Conference, or you may have read about them in past issues of the Church Today.

Mr. Descant was born and raised in Alexandria, Louisiana. He graduated high school in 1958 and completed a bachelor of science degree in pharmacy from Northeast State University (now ULM) in Monroe, Louisiana in 1963. He has been a practicing pharmacist for sixty years.

In 2001, Descant married his wife, Liz, a retired teacher and school administrator. They founded Holy Trinity Ministries of Louisiana in 2016. They visit prayer groups, churches, and schools sharing their ministry.

It was during the 1980s when he became inspired to begin writing prayer poems. The prayer poems he writes are for all denominations. Over the years, he had the poems printed on cards and gave them away by the thousands. Many people kept asking him to publish a book but he resisted due to the fact he nor Liz knew anything about book publishing. As time went on, people kept asking which led them to finally do the research about publishing a book. After a long, 16-month process, here we are!

Mr. Descant continues to work as a pharmacist part time while writing prayer poems and sharing their ministry. Between the couple are five children and twenty-two grandchildren and great-grandchildren. They have a busy and blessed life!



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How long does it take to study for Priesthood? Answer: Six to nine years!

Rome has recently made some changes to the seminary formation process.

No matter the age of the seminarian, his first year is call a propaedeutic year (preliminary year) which is a year focusing on the basics of seminary life, prayer life, service, human maturity, and a few general education classes. After the propaedeutic year, the seminarian will begin his studies in philosophy.

If a seminarian does not a have a college Bachelor's Degree, he will attend a College Seminary where he will obtain a Bachelor of Arts Degree with 36 hours of study in Philosophy after completing his propaedeutic year. However, if a seminarian already has a bachelor's degree from an accredited college, he will begin Pre-Theological Studies after his propaedeutic year.

If he continues in responding to his call to priesthood, he will go forward for 3.5 years of theological studies and obtain a Masters of Divinity or a Masters of Theology (depending upon the seminary).

Upon completion of studies, he is eligible to be ordained a deacon and will serve as a transitional deacon in a parish in our diocese for 6 months. After this deacon internship, the transitional deacon will become eligible to be ordained a priest. In his first 3-5 years of priesthood, he will serve as a parochial vicar or associate pastor in a parish!

I am honored to have the opportunity to volunteer with Catholic Charities of Central Louisiana. With Disaster Relief, Mental Health, and Basic Needs Services as the organization's three main initiatives, there are many areas where one can lend a helping hand. 'Never, never lose faith,' says man whose miraculous cure as child led to St. Kateri Tekakwitha's canonization

(OSV News) — Jake Finkbonner first decided to become a medical doctor when he was in middle school.

"I'd love to help people the same way that so many people have helped me," the 23-yearold from Ferndale, Washington, explained to OSV News.

The recent college graduate drew his inspiration from the doctors who rushed to rescue him from an aggressive flesh-eating bacteria that tore through his face more than 17 years ago. They had help: Finkbonner's family and community turned to then-Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha to intercede for the 6-year-old's life. The day after her relic entered his hospital room, the infection — without explanation — stopped.

The cure became the second and final miracle needed for the canonization of St. Kateri Tekakwitha, a 17th-century Kanien'kéha:ka (Mohawk) Catholic and the first Native American woman to be declared a saint. She was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI Oct. 21, 2012.

Finkbonner recently spoke with OSV News about the miracle, his apparent visit to heaven while hospitalized, his faith, and his special connection to St. Kateri Tekakwitha, including his own Native American heritage.

When people hear his story, Finkbonner hopes that they first take away the importance of having faith.

"I can't really convey this message as well as my parents, but in listening to them tell their story of watching me and everything that they went through, I would say that it would be to never, never lose faith," he said.

In 2006, Finkbonner was playing basketball with the local Boys & Girls Club when he cut his lip on the supporting bar at the base of the portable basketball hoop.

At first, doctors assured his family that Finkbonner, who was almost 6 years old, would be fine. But after he visited the family doctor a third time, this time with a dangerously swollen face, he was sent to the local emergency room. From there, he flew via airlift to

Seattle Children's Hospital.

Medical professionals later discovered that Finkbonner had contracted flesh-eating bacteria called strep A through his cut.

For most of his time in the hospital, Finkbonner said, he remained unconscious in a druginduced coma. He underwent daily surgeries as doctors removed the accumulating dead scar tissue from his face.

His sixth birthday came and went before his parents contacted Father Tim Sauer, then-pastor of St. Joseph Parish in Ferndale, about administering last rites. He coordinated for a priest to visit and, at the same time, recommended the family turn to Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha for help.

Finkbonner and the holy woman shared similarities, from their Native American heritage (Finkbonner is a quarter Native American, of the Lummi nation) to suffering from attacks to their faces (smallpox scarred St. Kateri Tekakwitha's face).

Soon after, Finkbonner's mother, Elsa, began praying to God for a sign. That sign arrived when his father's aunt, who is a religious sister, visited the hospital — and brought a friend with her.

Upon arrival, his relative introduced her friend as "Sister Kateri," Finkbonner said. Sister Kateri not only shared a name with Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, but also placed a relic of the holy woman by his bedside.

"It was actually that next day that (the doctors) said, 'Yeah, the infection stopped, and we don't know why," Finkbonner said. "It was all recovery from that point."

A few weeks later, he returned home after months in the hospital. He faced a long road ahead: Every year, until he turned 18, he underwent reconstructive surgery.

"I had to learn how to walk again," he remembered. "Talking was a little tough because of still much scar tissue on my face. They gave me a big plastic mask to wear because so much of my skin had been exposed."

His family, friends, and school community at Assumption Catholic School in Bellingham, Washington, supported him and his family every step of the way, he emphasized. He remembered, in particular, when his kindergarten teacher held a "mask day" where all of the students wore masks that they made so that he did not feel alone.

While he was unconscious for most of his hospital stay, Finkbonner remembers at least one incident he believed took place: visiting heaven.

"I had a sensation that I was waking up, that I could hear doctors talking to my parents," he described. "I could feel my body start to be lighter. And, instead of

standing, I flew upwards." When he opened his eyes, he

found himself in heaven. "I remember a feeling

of warmth and comfort and everything was very bright," he said.

He also spotted familiar faces: his Uncle Tom, his godfather who had passed away just two weeks before of a heart attack, and his mother's grandmother, who died before he was born.

"I went up and I gave him a hug and I remember he breathed warm air on me," he revealed. "For a moment, his heart left his body and it came into mine and I had two beating hearts."

When Finkbonner asked if he could stay, Jesus responded that everyone back home still needed him

"I remember feeling super crushed and terribly sad about the whole thing," Finkbonner said, "but in my heart I knew that he was right."

Before leaving, he recalled hearing what he described as 1,000 pennies dropping on concrete all at once. His body started to feel heavy.

"Just like that," he said, "I was back."

According to his mother, the experience occurred after his "initial waking up" from the coma.

"I don't remember any of that (initial waking up) part, but I certainly remember waking up from that one," Finkbonner said. "For me, I'd say, that was my awakening."

Finkbonner recalled hearing about how, before his recovery, his parents, Donny and Elsa, placed their trust in God.

One day, he said, his mother read the Bible verses where God commands Abraham to sacrifice his only son, Isaac. Afterward, his parents entered the hospital chapel to pray.

"They essentially said, 'He is yours. Do with him what you will," Finkbonner said. "And if it was God's will to take me home, then so be it. They will accept that."

His parents' faith in that moment inspired him, he said.

"For them to never lose faith and to believe in God so heavily, I can only be filled with admiration for them," he commented. In addition to attending Sunday Mass, Finkbonner participated in activities at the Newman Center, or Catholic campus ministry, at Western Washington University before graduating in June.

During his daily prayers, he regularly turns to St. Kateri Tekakwitha. He frequently prays in his car where, he said, a rosary hangs from the rearview mirror.

"As far as daily prayers go, (the) majority of my prayer is gratitude," he said. "There's a lot of stuff for me to be grateful for."

The national office of the St. Kateri Tekakwitha Conference Center has moved its headquarters to the Archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The headquarters had been located at 2225 N. Bolton Ave., Alexandria, since October 2013.

Before coming to Louisiana, the headquarters for the Conference was located in Montana and was moved to Alexandria by then executive director, Sister Kateri Mitchell, SSA. Sister Kateri retired in 2018.

The Conference has been searching for an executive director for several years now and the hope is that they will be successful in their new location due to the large population of Catholic Native Americans in that area of the United States.

The mission of the Tekakwitha Conference national office is two-fold: -evangelization among indigenous Catholics of North America under the protection of St. Kateri, and promotion of the devotion to St. Kateri, the first North American indigenous saint (canonized Oct. 21, 2012).




