Notre Dame Seminary celebrates 100 years of formation

Father Joshua Rodrigue, the rector-president of Notre Dame Seminary, reflected on a Scripture passage from Isaiah as he told the story of the seminary's 100 years as the place in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New Orleans where thousands of men have been prepared for the priesthood.

"The prophet Isaiah reminds us of what has happened over the century within the walls of Notre Dame Seminary," Father Rodrigue said in his homily at the Centennial Mass at St. Louis Cathedral, honoring the seminary's founding in 1923. "Their holocausts and sacrifices will be acceptable on my altar, for my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples."

"In the heart of our seminary - in (the Blessed Mother's) chapel - hundreds of thousands of Masses and the holocausts and sacrifices offered on the altars in our chapel have been acceptable to our Lord. ... And it is not just the chapel that is designated as a house of prayer. The seminary itself is a house of prayer."

Archbishop Gregory Aymond was the principal celebrant of the centennial Mass, and he was joined by seven other bishops and priests of the archdiocese.

Father Rodrigue said just as the apostle John learned more about Jesus by taking Mary into his home as Jesus requested at the foot of the cross, so do seminarians learn more about a personal relationship with Jesus during their time studying and interacting with other

seminarians.

"I see Notre Dame Seminary today as a home because it is in the home that vocations truly begin," he said. "It is in the home at Nazareth where our Lord experienced the school of Mary and Joseph. And, from our Gospel today, it is in the home of John that the beloved disciple finished his formation in the school of Mary.

"From his years of formation with Jesus, John learned the teachings and the Gospel way of life. But, in taking Mary into his home, would not the beloved disciple have learned more about the Lord that he loved? The hours of hearing from Mary what Jesus was like as a boy, the story of him living in the home at Nazareth. That's how you get to know about someone - from their parents."

Seitz: Jesus compels us to 'respond with charity,' address 'coercive forces' driving migrants

(OSV News) — As the Catholic Church in the U.S. marks National Migration Week Sept. 18-24, Bishop Mark J. Seitz of El Paso, Texas, chair of the U.S. bishops' Committee on Migration, highlighted the need to "address the coercive forces driving people to migrate."

While often interchangeably, the terms "migrant" and "refugee" are defined under separately international law, with refugees specifically protected due to perilous conditions — such as war or persecution — that make returning to the country of origin impossible. In contrast, no uniform definitions of "migrant" or "forced migration" exist at the international level, according to the United Nations, although migrants are nonetheless protected as human persons under international human rights law.

In his message prepared for the 109th World Day of Migrants and Refugees observed Sept. 24, Pope Francis reflected that "the decision to migrate should always be free, yet in many cases, even in our day, it is not.

"Conflicts, natural disasters, or more simply the impossibility of living a dignified and prosperous life in one's native land is forcing millions of persons to leave," said the pope. "Migrants flee because of poverty, fear or

desperation. Eliminating these causes and thus putting an end to forced migration calls for shared commitment on the part of all, in accordance with the responsibilities of each."

Those insights were echoed by Bishop Seitz in a Sept. 15 statement released by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops ahead of National Migration Week.

"Through our belief in

Jesus Christ, we are compelled to respond with charity toward those who must uproot their lives in search of refuge," Bishop Seitz said. He added that "efforts to manage migration — even when predicated on the common good — require that we also address the coercive forces driving people to migrate."

"For millennia, people have been forced to flee their homelands, seeking safety and security, because of factors beyond their control," Bishop Seitz said. "Pope Francis reminds us that Sacred Scripture reveals the Holy Family's own flight into Egypt was not the result of a free decision, nor were many of the migrations that marked the history of the people of Israel."

Bishop Seitz said, "Only through collective efforts to alleviate these (coercive) forces and by establishing the conditions required for integral human development can people truly avail themselves of the right to remain in their country of birth.

"May God, through the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe, sustain us in these pursuits and protect those whose lives depend upon their success," said Bishop Seitz.

In their 2000 pastoral letter "Welcoming the Stranger Among Us: Unity in Diversity," the U.S. bishops pointed to Catholic social teaching on migration, which balances both the needs of migrants and the concerns of the nations to which they relocate.

The three principles of that teaching hold first, that people have the right to migrate to sustain their lives and the lives of their families; second, a country has the right to regulate its borders and to control immigration; and third, a country must regulate its borders with justice and mercy.

The bishops of the U.S. and Mexico issued a 2003 joint pastoral letter, "Strangers No Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope," stating, "All persons have the right to find in their own countries the

economic, political, and social opportunities to live in dignity and achieve a full life through the use of their God-given gifts. In this context, work that provides a just, living wage is a basic human need."

The bishops also declared in the letter that "migrants have a right to claim refugee status without incarceration and to have their claims fully considered by a competent authority."





In Memoriam - Fr. Richard Alain Fale 1919-1987

As summer turns to fall our thoughts often turn to those who have gone ahead of us not just friends and family but also those who helped shape the world around us. If you have spent time at Maryhill you may have wondered who painted the striking murals in the main chapel. The answer is Fr. Richard Alain Fale. A talented artist in oils and watercolors, Fr. Fale (pronounced fall-ee) was responsible for the murals at Maryhill as well as the murals at the convent chapel of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word at Cabrini Hospital. In addition to his paintings, Fr. Fale also designed and constructed the

stained glass windows at Maryhill and was an accomplished potter. He taught ceramics and pottery to the seminarians at Maryhill as well as to students at Holy Savior Menard. Many families still cherish the beautiful glazed Nativity sets he produced with his students.

Fr. Richard Fale was born on Jan. 17, 1919 in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to immigrant parents. He graduated from Sheboygan Central High School in 1936 and enrolled in the Layton School of Art in Milwaukee. During the Second World War he served as a radio operator and gunner in the South Pacific. After the war he worked for Conrad Schmitt

Studios doing church decorating and painting. In 1950, during a renovation project in Los Angeles, Richard Fale felt the stirrings of a religious vocation and decided to enter the Carmelites at Holy Hill in Wisconsin. Later while working in Louisiana he saw the need for diocesan priests in the rural south and petitioned Bishop Charles P. Greco of Alexandria, LA to receive him as a seminarian. Bishop Greco welcomed the talented young man and sent him to complete his studies at Assumption Seminary in San Antonio. Richard Fale was ordained for the Alexandria diocese on May 31, 1958 at St. John's Cathedral in Milwaukee.

1972- first as an associate at St. Matthew's Church in Monroe and then as spiritual director and religion teacher at Maryhilll Seminary and in the art department of Holy Savior Menard Central High School in Alexandria. Fr. Fale left the Alexandria diocese with permission to care for his aging parents and was incardinated in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee in 1974 where he served as an associate pastor in his home parish of Ss. Cyril and Methodiuus in Shaboygan where he had been baptized in 1919. He was appointed administrator of the parish in 1981 and served

He served in the diocese until until his death from cancer on 2- first as an associate at St. December 1, 1987.

Some of Fr. Fale's work survives at the Maryhill campus where the murals decorate both the main chapel and the retreat chapel. The murals at Cabrini Hospital were lost when the convent chapel was torn down for the construction of the new ER facility. A large canvas of the Madonna and Child is part of the collection at St. Juliana Church in Alexandria where Fr. Fale served as administrator in 1964. Large watercolors featuring scenes from Melrose Plantation can be seen at St. Augustine's Church at Ile Brevelle.

Historic times: Louisiana could soon see 8 new saints with ties to our state

Louisiana is home to the New Orleans Saints Football Team, but with the state's strong roots in Catholic faith, it may not be surprising to hear we may be growing some Catholic saints of our own!

There are currently eight "Servants of God" who are undergoing the process of becoming potential saints in the Catholic Church, all with ties to our state.

On Aug. 8, three Catholic priests from different dioceses in Louisiana met with KALB, the local NBC news affiliate in Alexandria, LA, to share the stories of these eight brave souls who died in faith.

Father Peter Mangum, a priest from the Diocese of Shreveport, is the Episcopal Delegate for five priests from the Shreveport area who died in 1873 during the yellow fever outbreak. Known as the Five Martyrs, they are Father Isidor Quemerais, Fr. Jean Pierre, Fr. Jean Marie Biler, Fr. Louis Marie Gergaud, and Fr. François Le Vezouet. All of these priests are orginally from Brittany, France but were brought to Louisiana by the first Bishop of Natchitoches, Bishop Auguste Martin. Fr. Magnum spoke of the priests' heroism as they each knowingly went to their deaths to serve the dying people in northern Louisiana and administer the sacraments

Father Taylor Reynolds, a priest from the Diocese of Alexandria, is the Episcopal Delegate for a little 12-year-old girl named Charlene Richard, who died of leukemia in 1959. Charlene showed extraordinary faith in the last two weeks of her life, offering up her terrible pains for others in need, showing us a courageous example of redemptive suffering.

regarding "miracles" that happened due to the intercession of an individual. Once miracles have been documented, a recommendation is submitted to the Pope, by whose authority they would then be deemed "Venerable." The next steps include verifying the miracles for beatification where they will be referred to as "Blessed" and then canonization where they become

Perhaps we can take the time to learn more about them and take their examples of faith to heart.

Father Mark Ledoux, a priest from the Diocese of Lafayette, is the Episcopal Delegate for Lt. Fr. Joseph Verbis Lafleur, a young priest and military chaplain who gave his life trying to save men at sea in 1944 during World War II. Fr. Lafleur also showed great selflessness and sacrifice during his time as a prisoner of war, helping anyone he could without a thought for himself.

Father Travis Abadie, a priest from the Diocese of Lafayette, the Episcopal Delegate for Auguste "Nonco" Pelafigue, was not able to attend the interview with KALB, but we learned about his cause through Fr. Reynolds. "Nonco" lived from 1888 to 1977 and was just a man who lived a simple, holy life, showing great humility and kindness to others.

It was also a historic day for these four priests, who met together in person for the first time as they discussed the 8 "Servants of God" and their causes for canonization.

At this stage, each candidate is referred to as "Servant of God." The next step is the "inquiry of miracles" where a period of time is spent documenting testimony

Sister Margaret Ann Verzwyvelt, CDP

Sister Margaret Verzwyvelt, CDP, (also known as Sister M. Gregory) entered eternal life on August 20, 2023, at the age of 89. She was born May 31, 1934, in Alexandria. These lay people formally accepted to follow the charism and value of Providence. Together Sister Margaret Ann and the Associates served the needs of the poor in the area by spreading the charism of Providence.





What is the Eucharistic Revival? A movement for the life of the world

As a recent college graduate, I had two options before me as I discerned my personal vocation: I could turn in on myself or turn out in love. The inward turn was where I perceived safety and control. The outward movement felt like it would result in loss of control and journeying into the doomed unknown. I paused, breathed deeply, and felt the beating of my own heart, yet I sensed that there was a more palpable presence in that tiny chapel. And in that Presence— Jesus' Eucharistic Presence—I chose to journey into the unknown, trusting I would never be alone.

I wish I could say this pivotal moment of decision was one and done. Alas, not so! My decision to enter religious life was indeed foundational, but I still confront the choice to move inward or outward each and every day. This invitation to outward movement that characterizes the Christian Life isn't neat and tidy, it has no ten-year plan, and there is only one guarantee if we choose life in Christ: the Cross and the Glory in our eternal home.

I believe the movements that stir in each of our hearts are truly the interior bedrock of the National Eucharistic Revival

What Makes the Eucharistic Revival Different?

As our vision statement

testifies, we aspire to inspire "a movement of Catholics across the United States, healed, converted, formed, and unified by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist—and sent out on mission 'for the life of the world.'"

We live in a world replete with movements: humanitarian, social, political, spiritual, ideological, existential... so, what sets the Eucharistic Revival apart? How is it different, and why should we allow ourselves to be caught up in it?

One word: Jesus.

Now, don't get me wrong. I am not saying Jesus isn't part of any of the other movements out there. Any movement that captures truth, goodness, or beauty has its origin in our God. As Christians, we have a 2,000-year tradition of recognizing that where there is truth, goodness, and beauty, there we find the logoi spermatikoi-the seeds of the Word, and the Word is Christ. We neither blindly support nor quickly condemn any movement, but rather discern where we find Jesus within it and how he may be inviting us to take part.

What distinguishes the Eucharistic Revival from all other movements is that it is totally fixed on Jesus.

The Life of the World

Jesus in the Eucharistic Sacrifice renewed at every Mass is truly the center of the Universe. This "source and summit" of the

Christian life (Lumen Gentium, no. 11) is the origin of all truth, goodness, and beauty. This is what the Church teaches, and this is why the Eucharistic Revival is different: it is a movement wholly fixed upon the Presence of Jesus and his desire for communion with us forever.

Jesus, the Divine Mover, courses through human history not to condemn us but to save us through his total gift of self, his final sacrifice offered on Calvary and triumphant at the moment of Resurrection. In a real way his sacrifice is made present to us at every Mass. "... a vague memory of the Last Supper would do no good. We need to be present at that Supper, to be able to hear his voice, to eat his Body and to drink his Blood. We need Him" (Desiderio Desideravi, no. 11).

The saving graces of redemption won for us are represented at the altar every time a Catholic priest celebrates the Liturgy, and these graces are offered for us to receive into our own bodies in Eucharistic communion. Jesus' Flesh is the Life of the World. This is why this movement is different: because it courses toward eternal life in a way no other movement ever could.

A Truly Eucharistic

In this movement, Jesus isn't shackled to an altar, a tabernacle, or the pyx of a hospital chaplain.

He goes out... he MOVES. He makes his Real Presence known. His Eucharistic Presence is pervasive because it can be given and received: he chooses to move among us and (how remarkable!) within us!

Jesus thirsts to be ever more alive in us, transforming and renewing us so that we can journey with him. As I open my heart to him. I come to know him as a friend: Jesus and I become mutually vulnerable. He gives himself and I can choose to respond by giving a little more of myself. That vulnerability leads to a deepening intimacy, a bond of love and communion that is life-changing and ecstatic-it moves us out of ourselves! It unites us not only to Jesus but also to all his other friends, so that we experience deeply what it means to be his Body, the Church. This outward movement is a truly **Fucharistic Movement!**

Every time we receive the Eucharist, saying "amen" with a humble, contrite heart, we proclaim the Death of the Lord and his Resurrection. Receiving communion is a profound act of faith. Jesus' life is renewed and imbibed ever more intensely with us, flowing through our own veins, mingling with our own blood. Slowly, over time, we grow in the desire to be like Jesus—to offer our own flesh, in communion with him.

From this movement, we can

be Jesus' presence in all the other noble movements that surround us, Christifying them so that these other movements are caught up in the one movement, the only movement that will last until the end of time: Jesus' own movement through human history to "draw all creation to Himself" (Jn 12:30–32) and to journey with us back to the Father, so that we may have that abundant life we have always thirsted for but could never attain on our own.

A dear theology professor from my graduate school years once said, "Good Friday is when the Homeland enters exile so that the exiles may enter the Homeland." What happened on Good Friday is represented for us in the Eucharist. My friends, the Homeland is right here, right now!

So, what is the National Eucharistic Revival? It is a movement inviting us to rediscover Jesus' desire to give us his flesh for the life of the world. It is sweet in its simplicity, intentional in its integrity, and heartfelt in its humility. The world needs Jesus, and Jesus has entrusted himself to the Catholic Church—in a way unlike any other—in the Holy Eucharist. Let's allow his Real Presence to draw us into this movement, his movement, our movement, so that we, with Christ, can offer our own flesh in loving service and passionate selfsacrifice for the life of the world.
