# Doctrinal dicastery explains gay couples can be blessed outside of formal liturgical blessing

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — A Catholic priest can bless a gay or other unmarried couple as long as it is not a formal liturgical blessing and does not give the impression that the Catholic Church is blessing the union as if it were a marriage, the Vatican doctrinal office said.

The request for a blessing can express and nurture "openness to the transcendence, mercy and closeness to God in a thousand concrete circumstances of life, which is no small thing in the world in which we live. It is a seed of the Holy Spirit that must be nurtured, not hindered," the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith said in a formal declaration published Dec. 18.

"Fiducia The document. Supplicans" ("Supplicating Trust") was subtitled, "On the pastoral meaning of blessings," and was approved by Pope Francis during an audience with Cardinal Víctor Manuel Fernández, dicastery prefect, Dec. 18.

In his introductory note. Cardinal Fernández said questions about a priest blessing a LGBTQ+ or other unmarried couple had been sent to the doctrinal office repeatedly over the past few years.

The need for a fuller explanation of blessings became clear, he wrote, after Pope Francis responded to the "dubia" or questions of several cardinals in a letter released in early October.

In his letter, the pope insisted marriage is an "exclusive, stable and indissoluble union between a man and a woman, naturally open to conceiving children," which is why the church "avoids all kinds of rites or sacramentals that could contradict this conviction and

imply that it is recognizing as a marriage something that is not."

At the same time, the pope said, "pastoral prudence must adequately discern if there are forms of blessing, solicited by one or various persons, that don't transmit a mistaken concept of marriage.'

Cardinal Fernández said the declaration "remains firm on the traditional doctrine of the Church about marriage, not allowing any type of liturgical rite or blessing similar to a liturgical rite that can create confusion," but it also explores the "pastoral meaning of blessings" in a way that opens "the possibility of blessing couples in irregular situations and samesex couples without officially validating their status or changing in any way the Church's perennial

teaching on marriage."

The church "remains firm" in teaching that marriage can be contracted only between one woman and one man, he said, and continues to insist that "rites and prayers that could create confusion" about a marriage and another form of relationship "are inadmissible."

But in Catholic tradition blessings go well beyond the formal ritual used in marriage and other sacraments.

"Blessings are among the most widespread and evolving sacramentals. Indeed, they lead us to grasp God's presence in all the events of life and remind us that, even in the use of created things, human beings are invited to seek God, to love him, and to serve him faithfully," the declaration said. That is why people, meals, rosaries, homes, pets and myriad other things can be and are blessed on various occasions.

"From a strictly liturgical point of view," the declaration said, "a blessing requires that what is blessed be conformed to God's will, as expressed in the teachings of the Church," which is why the then-doctrinal congregation in 2021 excluded the possibility of blessing gay couples.

But, the new document said, Catholics should "avoid the risk of reducing the meaning of blessings" to their formal, liturgical use because that "would lead us to expect the same moral conditions for a simple blessing that are called for in the reception of the sacraments."

"Indeed, there is the danger that a pastoral gesture that is so beloved and widespread will be subjected to too many moral prerequisites, which. under the claim of control, could overshadow the unconditional power of God's love that forms the basis for the gesture of blessing,"

A person who asks for God's blessing, the declaration said, "shows himself to be in need of God's saving presence in his life and one who asks for a blessing from the Church recognizes the latter as a sacrament of the salvation that God offers."

The church, it said, should be grateful when people ask for a blessing and should see it as a sign that they know they need God's help.

"When people ask for a blessing, an exhaustive moral analysis should not be placed as a precondition for conferring it. For, those seeking a blessing should not be required to have prior moral perfection," it said.


At the same time, the declaration insisted that the Mass is not the proper setting for the less formal forms of blessing that could include the blessing of a gay couple, and it repeated that "it is not appropriate for a diocese, a bishops' conference" or other church structure to issue a formal blessing prayer or ritual for unwed couples. The blessing also should not be given "in concurrence" with a civil marriage ceremony to avoid appearing as a sort of church blessing of the civil union.

However, it said, a priest or deacon could "join in the prayer of those persons who, although in a union that cannot be compared in any way to a marriage, desire to entrust themselves to the Lord and his mercy, to invoke his help and to be guided to a greater understanding of his plan of love and of truth."

presenters of the Catholic faith; to not simply speak about the 'what's' we believe, but the convincing 'why's' as well." Ignited with his new-found knowledge and zeal, he started Fullness of Truth, and the apostolate has enlightened many tens of thousands of attendees over more than two decades. Particularly rewarding is learning how attendees' lives have been changed by attending a Fullness of Truth conference: several men crediting such events in particular as the turning point in their discernment to become a priest; men and women overhauling their lives and careers to glorify God as a priority; and families opening their hearts further by embracing the gift of children.

### Season of Service set to kick off Feb. 14

Being a native Louisianian, I experienced the generosity and caring spirit of people in our area from a very young age. Whether a hurricane, tornado or some other natural disaster, we come together in a time of need.

Sure, we have our struggles in the South. The roads are horrible, reports of crime and violence in our area take up the majority of the newscast each night, and we can experience all four seasons within a couple of days, but when it comes to responding to a disaster or community need, there is no place I would rather be.

It is this sense of "service" that led to the idea of having a diocesan program giving people an opportunity to come together in "peace time" (as opposed to emergency response) to lend our helping hands to projects that make our church a better place to worship and our community a better place to live.

During the Lenten season of 2022, we launched the program called Season of Service (SoS). Lent is the perfect time to host this program because we are all looking for ways to strengthen our prayer life, observe periods of fasting, and participate in helping others through almsgiving. What

better way to accomplish this than to serve others? Over the past two years, there have been nearly 100 teams made up of approximately 1,000 volunteers working on projects throughout the diocese.

The premise of the program is to recruit team captains who in turn develop a team of 3 to 10 (or so) people. This team decides on

# **Father Henri Marie Francois Jacquemin**

### Temporary assignment in Moreauville reults in one of the longest pastorates in parish's history

Since the Gospel was first proclaimed to the Tensas Indians in 1682 by Fr. Zenobius Membre, over 825 priests are known to have ministered in north Louisiana. The great majority of these have been foreign born missionaries who at great sacrifice have fed the flame of faith in our midst.

In March 1916, Bishop Van de Ven met a French priest who had been serving as a missionary in Mexico. Civil unrest in that country had led to formation of a Masonic government hostile to the Church and her interests. As a result, a law was passed expelling all foreign priests from the country.

Fr. Henri Jacquemin, a native of Nancy in France had been at work in Mexico since 1902 serving as a seminary professor. He accepted the bishop's invitation to work in the Alexandria diocese until such time as he would be able to return to Mexico. Bishop Van de Ven assigned him as 'temporary pastor' of Sacred Heart Church in Moreauville. Little did either man realize that this temporary arrangement would result in one of the longest pastorates in the parish's history.

Fr. Jacquemin began his clerical studies at the minor seminary in Pont a Mousson in the Diocese of Nancy at the age of 10. He was ordained a priest on August 8, 1897 after securing degrees in theology and canon law from the Sorbonne in Paris where he excelled in languages and music. He served as a professor at the Pont a Mousson seminary for two years and then as pro-secretary to the Bishop of Nancy before volunteering for the missions in Mexico in 1902. He served as a seminary professor in Mexico until his expulsion from the country in 1916.

On his arrival in Moreauville, Fr. Jacquemin found that he had inherited an unfinished brick shell of a church. A fire on Christmas day had destroyed the previous church along with the rectory,

school and convent in 1908. A previous pastor, Fr. Regis Gimbert had erected a new rectory and a school building before his early death in 1912 at the age of 51. He was buried in the unfinished church which Fr. Jacquemin inherited



For the next 16 years, Fr. Jacquemin labored to complete and beautify the church in Moreauville. Due to a lack of funds, the plans for the church had to be scaled down from the original design submitted by the architect, Theodore Grune. Instead of two towers on the front façade, Fr. Jacquemin designed a new single tower with a small dome. Walking the streets of Moreauville, he

collected any wood he could find and painstakingly crafted three elaborate altars as well as the intricate ceiling of the new sacristy.

Traveling to his native France in 1924 and again in 1930, Fr. Jacquemin purchased ornaments and vestments for the restored church as well as a new set of Stations of the Cross.

On May 22, 1934, the completed church was solemnly dedicated by Bishop Daniel Desmond with Fr. Jacquemin offering the Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving. During his time as pastor, Fr. Jacquemin also served missions at Big Bend, Evergreen, Red Fish, Rosewood, Tilden and Wayside.

In 1942, after 29 years in Moreauville, Fr. Jacquemin retired from active ministry and took up residence in a private home. In 1952, due to continued ill health, he entered Cabrini Hospital in Alexandria where he remained until his death on April 12, 1956 at the age of 83. His funeral was conducted from the Maryhill Seminary chapel and his body was laid to rest in the clergy cemetery at Maryhill.





# First things first

My point is this—when you are longing to be first in someone's heart, or in first place, remember, my dear sisters in Christ, Whose heart you ultimately belong to,

and where you ought to place the aches of life. Jesus Christ will always choose us, without fail. He will always relentlessly pursue us, until we can be one with the Beloved. He so desires for every soul to rejoice in the Beatific Vision.

### Making Him Our First Choice

So, I ask you this-what is your vision set on? How are you making our Lord and Savior your first choice in the big and little things? Do you default to human consolation, without first resting in His sweet embrace? Do you allow our Lord to console you by

laying it all down at His feet and pouring your heart out to Him, the One who created you and knows your deepest desires? Are you confident that, no matter what happens, He never ceases to be in control and wills the ultimate

In the midst of the everyday, how can we honor the One Who awaits us? Our earthly pilgrimage to eternity presents us with countless ways to consciously choose Him.



Eventually, you can add in a daily examination of conscience, try a litany, or weave in a novena. As we start and end our day, He is the One ultimately behind every breath and heartbeat. Let us not forget He sustains us and is always with us.

- 2. Start to pray the Rosary. When we honor Mary, we honor her Son. First, try one decade in the morning or at night. Then, two. Later, as you progress, you can add in the mysteries of each day. Perhaps you can pick a day of the week, like Saturday, to recite five decades and progress from there. It is not the perfect recitation of a prayer but the power of Whom we pray to that moves mountains and makes miracles happen. It is best to pray it well and pray it in full, but the Lord and Blessed Mother are pleased even when we just pray part of a daily Rosary.
- 3. Dive into a daily devotional. Find a book with two to three pages of meditation per day on Scripture, virtue, or other facets of the devout life (see Divine Intimacy or Imitation of Christ). You can also go straight to the Bible, a missal, or sign

up for daily emails to read the daily Mass readings, doing lectio divina every day or even just once a week. Start with what you know you can offer our Lord and set a structure. This might look like five or ten minutes at the start. Remember that our good Lord sees the intentions of our hearts and values quality over quantity. Even when you don't feel like it, stick to it. Remember that the Lord meets us where we are atin the stillness of silence or in the busyness of life. Don't neglect to come to Him just because the circumstances are not the best

Above all, remember to do small things with great love. Pray before a meal to give God gratitude. Make the Sign of the Cross when passing a Catholic Church to honor His Real Presence. Smile at a stranger, for anything we do for our neighbor, we do for Him. Make authentic love your motive in each moment.

The beauty of any of these suggestions is that when we put them into practice, we can continue to grow into abundance. There is no such thing as enough

when it comes to giving ourselves to the Lord. It is an ever-increasing process to strive for perfect unity with Christ, a lifelong endeavor worth the effort. Putting Him first is not one moment in time. It is not reserved only for the wee hours of the morning. It is a constant choosing of how we spend our time throughout the day, with every thought, action, and word.

### How We Use Our First Fruits

In a consumer-centric world, the clamor of noise can cloud our minds. The instant convenience of online delivery and satisfaction of instant "likes" on social media opposes the nature of forever, which is the eternity we were ultimately created for. We are in constant tension with the society we live in and the Heaven that calls us home. We might be tempted to think that the exterior world needs to change to fit our desires better, but in reality, change begins internally when we totally entrust our lives to the Lord. The beauty of frequenting the Sacraments while striving to cultivate a deep relationship with Christ is the way in which He provides the grace for those who take the first step in giving Him their first fruits. The Heavenly Bread we are fed at Mass and the mercy that washes over us in Confession will heal our souls and make us more like Him. It does not get more intimate than consuming the Eucharist and outright admitting our failures. Through this, the Lord's grace is sufficient for us to set out and accomplish anything.

We ought to give the Lord our first fruits, the best we can offer each and every day. Sometimes, that means throwing ourselves into His arms with all of our sorrows. The next time something disappointing happens, the next time something hurts you, the next time something dampens your spirit, turn to the Lord. He is eagerly awaiting us and has all the answers.

Before you try to scroll through some posts or text a friend, say a prayer to our Lord, won't you? Ask Him to reveal what this desire for affirmation really means and what it is rooted in. Spend some time in silence, whether it be in front of the Blessed Sacrament or on your commute home from work. Honor His importance in your life by seeking out the Almighty One first. Ladies, let us grow in friendship with our Lord and have recourse to Him. Run to the Father, and never stop until you reach the gates of Heaven.
